**Bees and Cold Weather.**

**Bee-keepers, the frost is fast** penetrating the best collars in the land. Avoid letting the bees remain any great length of time in a temperature of 32° without extra covers—rugs or carpets. Newspapers may be placed under the covers and tucked in at the bottom of the sides in such a way as to nearly box a row of hives perfectly from the cold for a time. I have, however, seen bees remain at 10 below freezing 10 weeks and some at all right (in an earth house).

**Though none the worse for it,** there is a risk in long continued cold.

**We prefer 45 deg.; 45 deg. is good** for heavy hives over forest leaves in pure air. There is absolutely no perceptible loss in the weight of a colony in ten weeks at 10 deg. below freezing.—W. S. H.
