KINGS CO. CAPTAIN MURDERED AT SEA

The daily press gives details of the brutal murder of Capt. Joseph Noble Chute, of the schooner "Lewis Brothers", on Feb. 22nd, on board his vessel in the Florida Straits. Capt. Chute was a native of Harbourville, in this county, and was between fifty and sixty years of age. He leaves a widow and five children living at Mobile, Ala. Capt. Chute was a brother of Mrs. Thomas Sutherland, of Lower Wolfville, and when a young man was for a time a resident here and is remembered by a number of Wolfville people. Seven or eight years ago he was at Port Williams where the vessel of which he was in command loaded deal for a south-sea port. In 1916 he was in command of a vessel which loaded at Halifax for Australia but was not able to proceed further than the Barbadoes.

The particulars of the murder are yet unknown. The vessel was found by the American oil-tanker Sabine Sun drifting with all sail hoisted near Molasses Reel with the British flag at half-mast. In response to signals a life-boat was lowered from the tanker and on arrival alongside the schooner the mate gave the information that the captain who was found dead in his cabin with three bullet wounds had committed suicide. As there was no one on board able to navigate the vessel the crew were then making preparations to abandon her. The schooner was taken to Key West, where the crew were placed under arrest.

The coroner's jury has ordered that the first mate, V. Brackleyhurst, a Dane, of the Virgin Islands, be held on a charge of murder, and that Charles Carter, cook, and Guseppe Amore, sailor, be also held as accessories.

REV. IVAN S. NOWLAN APPOINTED TO IMPORTANT POSITION

Many of the Maritime Province graduates of Acadia University will be interested in the selection of the Rev. Ivan S. Nowlan to succeed Rev. E. Morris Ferguson as general secretary of the Massachusetts Sunday School Association. Mr. Nowlan is not only a graduate of Acadia, but was for a time on the teaching staff of the college. Later he acted as secretary of the Baptist Sunday Schools in the Maritime Provinces, in which position he did excellent work. He took a course at the University of Chicago and after his graduation went to Fort Wayne where he had a large and influential pastorate. Mr. Nowlan was always deeply interested in work among boys and men, and has, in addition to his church work, attracted considerable attention by his religious educational work among the foreign populations in the Western States. His present position is the direct outcome of his personal interest and devotion to the broadening of the religious educational life of the people generally.
