The origin of 'boche' is obscure. There used to be current in Paris and other large cities in France the phrase tete de boche, which signified obstinate or hard-headed. To describe this quality they were called Allemand-boche, which became successively Allemoche, Alleboche, lboche and finally just Boche. Whatever its origin, it is used as a term of reproach.
