Peter concluded by expressing gratitude to the progressive spirit of Ed Mullaly of the English Department who allowed the concert to take place in Memorial Hall and further to thank Vince, Brenda and the Campus Police for a remarkably sensitive understanding of the audience which tended to spontaneously explode at any given moment.

"We've started something here," Peter said in closing, "and I would very much like to see it continue." Let's hope it does.
