The Council contains ten members; the Academic Board consists of nine Harvard professors and the President and Dean of Radcliffe.

Requirements for admission to Radcliffe are the same as those for admission to Harvard; the courses of instruction are practically the same as those offered by the "Faculty of Arts and Sciences," and instruction in Radcliffe is furnished by more than ninety Harvard professors, instructors, and assistants.

Radcliffe College is situated at the corner of Garden and Mason streets, the headquarters being in Fay House, No. 10 Garden St. The college owns also property fronting on Mason, James, Brattle Streets, and Appian Way, including Vaughan House, the "Cambridge School" Building, and the old Browne and Nichols School Building. A new and handsome gymnasium, the first of several new buildings which it is hoped will soon be erected, is in process of construction on Mason St. Money for a dormitory has been subscribed, and it is intended to erect a large and commodious building soon.

The College Library, of thousand volumes, is in Fay House. The College has also laboratories of Physics, Chemistry, Zoölogy, and Botany, and Radcline students have access to the scientific establishments of the University, and also the use of the University Library. Many graduate courses in the University are open to competent students at Radeliffe.

Since its organization the Society has issued its A. B. certificate to 65 women, and has conferred the A. B. degree on 106, the degree of A. M. upon 20, and two of its students have prepared theses, "which, had they been presented by Harvard students, would have been accepted as fully satisfying every requirement for the degree of Ph. D."

Radcliffe students have the benefit of six scholarships, and the Sargent and Sohler Prizes are open to them.

The enrolment during the past year was 413, 59 Graduates, 209 Undergraduates, and 145 Specials, an increase of 43 over the previous year.
