"LIGHT OF THE WORLD"

presses Sympathy With This Nove Touch For Union.

London, Jan. 10.—(C.A.".).—The Right Hon. Charles Booth, is senting Holman Hunt's great picture, "The Light of the World," to se exhibited in the principal civits of canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, after which he will offer it as a gift to the nation. Writing to Mr. Booth, Colonial Secretary Lyttleton, says: 'I leef great sympathy with your desire to add to the ties which bind together the various populations of the s.ligoverning states of the Empire by that lofty bond of union consisting in common admiration for the great and elevating works of hational and religious art."

The colonies would remain loyal whatever we did, but the question was whether our connection with the colonies was to be based on sentiment and blood relationship or on mutual community of interest.

Get At the Facts.

Sir Robert Finlay, Attorney-General, referring to the proposed conference at Inverness, said that both sides would enter it absolutely free, pledged to nothing. Any recommend ation the conference made would be submitted to the electors at the gen-eral election. Before any action could be taken the country ought to have the proper facts placed before it. He personally believed that taxa-tion of food was neither desirable or practicable, but they should have the facts.

Lord Durham's View.

Speaking at York, Lord Durham said the Liberals defence of free trade involved no antagonism to the colonies. It was merely a foolish cry of protectionists to discredit the Liberals. It was the Liberals who gave the colonies the most cherished pri-vilege of self-government. Liberals recognized the loyalty, the power and the importance of the colonies. Even if there were a few Liberals who were if there were a few Liberals who were not sound on the matter they were less dangerous than those protec-tionists who said the only way to maintain the integrity of the Empire was by an ignoble system of barter. Liberals regarded the Empire as bas-ed upon a far different basis, upon the freedom of Government, religion and commerce.

IMMIGRATION TO ONTARIO.

Figures For the Year Will Probably Reach 24,000.

Toronto, Jan. 10.—Thomas South-worth director of colonization, has received returns showing the total immigration into Ontario, exclusive of those coming from the United States, up to Lec. 1, to have been 23,206. For the full year the figures will probably reach 24,000. The aumher of immigrants last year was number of immigrants last year was 19,000. In 1900, when the depart-ment was organized, the number was only 3,000.

Cans than Sues For \$25,000

Caoa han Suce For \$25,000,
Ogdensburg, N.Y., Jan. 10—Canadian capitalists have begun suit in the Supreme Court against the Village of Waddington, St. Lawrence County, for \$25,000 for breach of contract. The village recently voted to sell the water power, which supplies the place with light and water for \$4,000. Before the property was transferred the Remington Paper Co. of Watertown obtained an option on it at \$1,500, intending to build a railroad at Norfolk to carry Canadian pulpwood to the mills at Racquette. The village electors then decided to control their own light and water service, and unanimously rescinded their previous action.

Capt. O'Hagan Deed.

St. Catharines, Jan. 10.—Capt.
Daniel O'Hagan, a well-known mariner and boat-owner, died very suddenly at an early hour here yesterday morning of heart failure being ill but a few minutes. Deceased was 49 years of age and a native lof Picton. Twelve years ago he came to this city, and in company with Capt. John Malcolmson, purchased the Welland Hotel. He retired from this and since has owned and run many different boats. Capt. O'Hagan Dead.

Asstralias Wheat Shortage.

Ottewa, Jan. 10.—According to D. H. Ross, Canadian Commercial Agent at Melbourne, the Australian Commonwealth will have approximately about 20,000,000 bushels of new wheat available for export, against 40,000,000 bushels exported in 1908-04. The effect of this segious decline is likely to be noticeable in European markets, and should harden prices.

St. John's, Nfid., Jan. 10.—Sir Alfred Harmsworth, heads the Anglo-Newfoundland Development Co., in-corporated here vesteriar with a capital stock of \$5,000,000 to manu-lacture pulp and paper in this land.
