ROSEBERY A STRONG LEADER

Lord Rosebery may not be laboring any harder now than he did when plowing his lonely furrow and doing his solitary spade work, but he is certainly bulking more largely in the public eye. If there has been any doubt as to who is the real protagonist of Joseph Chamberlain it should be dispelled after the great demonstration he elicited in South London on Wednesday. There is no other man on the Liberal side at the present moment who holds so much the public eye and is so great and universal a popular favorite. And this sympathetic ovation may have much greater significance than any mere temporary effect it has in connection with the present fiscal controversy. For all this enthusiasm on the part of so many thousands of the people is not exclusively inspired by the issue between protection and free trade. It is largely a personal tribute proffered by the rank and file of the Liberal party to the man who, they instinctively feel, holds the immediate future of the party in his hand. That this is so is practically shown by the attitude of the pro-Boer section. Ever since Lord Rosebery's patriotic attitude over the South African war and his determined opposition to the identification of the Liberal party with the views of the Little Englanders they have schemed and striven to extrude him and his supporters from the ranks. But his hold on the country has proven too strong, or they too weak, and they are now industriously engaged in covering their defeat with a cloud of verbal dust and ashes.

The reinstatement of Lord Rosebery as leader of the Liberal party in the United Kingdom would be fraught with issues of much moment to the empire. For notwithstanding his decided stand against Mr. Chamberlain's proposals he is an out and out Imperialist—was, indeed, ardently so long before Mr. Chamberlain turned his attention thitherwards. Nor is he altogether averse to special protective duties for special purposes, and in this he approximates somewhat to the view put forward by the Duke of Devonshire and many of the Free Food Leaguers. But the real weakness of the position taken up by Mr. Chamberlain's numerous and varied opponents lies in the fact that they are critics only. They are all great at inventing nicknames and discovering odious resemblances. They are expert in turning the edge of an embarrassing argument or covering a home-thrust with a more or less labored ridicule. All of them cannot do this with the light touch and airy grace of Lord Rosebery. But even he cannot wholly conceal the lack of substantiality in the panaceas he offers for the ills under which Britain is groaning. No doubt improved, practical, technical and commercial education is a good and highly desirable thing. So is the reduction of the national expenditure if it can be done without impairing the efficiency of the great services of the country. It would be very gratifying to all social reformers if the drink bill of the nation were reduced, the growth of cotton within the empire encouraged and British bagmen's general knowledge increased. These, however, are, like Premier Balfour's retaliation policy, just palliatives, not remedies. They are all in the way of good "training for race competition," but the great and primary essential is that the race competition shall be in the first place fair. This primary desideratum Mr. Chamberlain pledges himself to secure by promoting the inter-trade of the empire and providing an equal basis for negotiating with foreign rivals and competitors. And one remedy is better than an infinity of palliatives.

International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—David's Charge to Solomon—1 Chron. 28, 1-10.

Golden Text—"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart."

To-day's lesson gives us a grand and impressive scene to close the reign of David, the king chosen, "a man after God's own heart;" he desires to settle Solomon on the throne before he dies, so calls together all the leading men of the nation, and before them the aged king, poet, warrior and statesman rises to the occasion and gives evidence to all that his heart, faith and purpose are as strong as ever. David reviews the sovereign goodness of God toward him and his house, mentions his own ardent desire to build a house for the honor and worship of the God of Israel, but God denied him this supreme wish, but if he could not build he could gather the materials, those who cannot do one kind of work for God and His people can do another; all have some kind of service for the kingdom. "At it, all at it, and always at it," was Wesley's wise motto for Christian work. Age and youth stand here side by side, the one laying aside the cares and responsibilities of a throne, the other just about to take them up, one wise with long experience, the other having all to learn.

Verse 9—"And thou, Solomon, my son, know thou the God of thy father, and serve Him with a perfect heart and with a willing mind, for the Lord searcheth all hearts, and understandeth all the imaginations of the thoughts; if thou seek Him He will be found of thee; but if thou forsake Him He will cast thee off for ever."

Verse 10—"Take heed now; for the Lord hath chosen thee to build a house for the sanctuary; be strong and do it."

"Teach me to do Thy will, O God," should be the prayer of every child of the King of Kings, and strength to do it will be given to the willing mind.
