The object of this bill is to authorize the coinage of a standard silver dollar and to make it of legal tender value. Had provision been made to incorporate the proper complement of silver to place it on a par with the standard gold dollar, there would have been no exception taken to the measure; but the bill stipulates that these silver dollars shall contain 4121 grains only. According to the market value of silver they would be worth but from 90 to 92 cents; or in other words they are made to pass as legal tender for an amount from 8 to 10 cents in excess of their real value. As they are to be rated at their nominal value in payment of all debts and dues, public and private, this is breaking faith—or THE AMERICAN SILVER BILL.
