WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominiou land a Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made it any Dominion Lands Agency (but not sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and ultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within the miles of his homestead on a farm of it least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A abitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in

In certain districts a homesteader to good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price 53.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of hree years after earning homestead pat-nt; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-mption patent may be obtained as soon as omestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per cre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and rect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to renuction in case of rough, scrubby or stony and. Live stock may be substituted for ultivation under certain conditions.
