The attention of the council had been lately called to the fact that pawnbrokers were oper-ating in the city without license or regulaas, and a motion to pass an ordinance providing for the same was favorably considered. It was practically agreed that the license fee should be \$500 per annum and that the rate of interest to be charged should also be limited, but final action was deferred.

A proposition was also made to compel keep-ers of music halls to pay a license, and met with general favor. The need of legislation establishing and de-

fining the liability of agents to their comand of companies for the acts of their ents was also suggested, and action on that bject will be taken in the near future.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 12,-At the Liberal car esterday morning the premier annou that the government regarded the Pacific cable work as of imperial importance, and that at the present session a bill would be introdu for the purpose of defraying the proportion the cost which Canada shall bear. The Au lian colonies have already decided to pay it ninths of the cost, and the project has b hanging fire for months until it was de mined what proportion should be paid by th Home Government and Canada respectiv The Imperial authorities held, that Canadshould contribute an equal share with Great Britain. The Dominion Government ha come around to this view, so that Canada' contribution will be five-eighteenths of the total cost.

Among other subjects discussed to day w the gerrymander senate reform and the extension of the Inter-colonial railway to Mon tresl. On these subjects the government had little to communicate beyond the fact that these measures would be pressed at the present session.
