A Well-Known Hamiltonian Succumbs to Sunstroke,
Mr. Thomas B. Griffiths, a well-known citizen of Hamilton, died on Saturday. His death was the result of a sunstroke received on Friday, July 14. Mr. Griffiths was thought to be improving, but took suddenly worse Saturday morning and died at 4.30.

Deceased, who was only 41 years of age, was for eight or ten years ticket agent of the Grand Trunk at Hamilton, retiring in 1888. He purchased stock in the Hamilton Street Railway, and ultimately became manager of the company. A year later he was elected president of the company, retaining the management, and held the dual positions up to the time of his death. 
