VISITOR **ENGLISH**

Gives Her Opinion of the Chatham General Hospital

in the British Weekly - A Very Interesting Article on a Popular Institution.

In The British Weekly, an English journal of social and Christian progress, a recent visitor to Canada, signing herself "Lorna," makes the following interesting references to the General Hospital in Chatham, where she passed a brief illness:

"Strange as it may seem, it is quite the fashion in Canada and the States to go to a hospital when you are ill. to go to a hospital when you are ill. This is caused in a greet degree, I suppose, by the comparative homelessness' of many people over there. So many young couples live in boarding houses or in hotels, and to be laid up in either is most unpleasant, for I speak from experience. And it is here that their hospitals come in, and for a very moderate sum one can have every comfort, and a beautifully furnished room to one's self.

"For instance, take the hospital in which it was my lot to spend two

which it was my lot to spend two months as a patient. It is situated in a small Canadian town, not a hundred a small Canadian town, not a hundred miles from the American border, but anyone who wishes it can have its exact locality. It is run by some influential gentlemen in the town, and everyone has to pay. The town pays for the very poor two dollars a week (eight shillings), and they are accommodated on the top storey, two in a room. All the other beds, about twenty five or so are in separate rooms. ty-five or so, are in saparate rooms and are let at varying prices according to size, situation, etc. The dear est are ten dollars a week (£2), and they descend to four and three dollars

"There was only one vacant room when I went in, and the price was when I went in, and the price was five dollars (£1). Although, it was small, it had two windows, being a corner room. I meant to change to a ten dollar room, which fell vacant the following week, but had become so attached to my little room that I stayed on. This sum included excellent food, nursing, attendance, everything except your deep or's fees, which thing except your doctor's fees, which is a matter of private arrangement, and you can have any doctor you "There is an isolation block, built in the three-acre grounds, for infectious diseases, for which the charge is the same, or very slightly more. The hos pital has done so well that this year i s being greatly enlarged, a new theatre built, and sun-baths being provid ed. When the hospital was opened a great deal of furniture required was gifted to it. The room I had was called the Kinz's Deputher. ed the King's Daughter room, as it had been furnished by the guild of that name in the town. A Masonic lodge had furnished the next room, and their arms were carved over the

bureau and wardrobe.
"Several ladies had provided for various other rooms, either in memoriam of some one, or simply for the moriam of some one, or simply for the good cause. For it was a good cause, and to have such pretty furniture and linen, all different and marked for the individual rooms, made the hospital. so unlike the usual bare, cheerless place. This particular hospital paid itself; but even if there were to be slight deficit, surely the scheme worth the attention of some phil anthropist.

AMERICA

Did Not Derive its Name From America

Vespucci. That America derives its name from Amerigo Vespucci has long been regarded as a certainty. Now, however, historian comes forward and assures us that this is not the case. This his-torian is Ricardo Palma, Director of the National Library of Lima, Peru. In a book which has just been published he insists that America was not named after Americo Vespucci, but that, on the contrary, Amerigo Vespuci was named after America.

Senor Palma, who has studied this ibject for years, maintains that Vessucci's first name was Alberico. name 'America,' " he says, "is derived from a place in Nicaragua, being the name of a hill in the province of Chanroles. Furthermore, the penultimate yllable 'ic' is very often found in the words used by the Indians of South America and by the natives of the Antilles. The syllable itself signifies something large and lofty, and is found in the names of non-volcanic

He further points out that Columbus did not use the word "America" in his letters when he referred to the events of his first voyage. "It is more than probable," he continues, "that he learned through one of his attendants of the discovery of gold by some natives in a place called America. In this way it is likely that the name graduilly became known throughout Europe. At that time the only geographical ac-count of the western hemisphere was the one by Alberico Vespucci, which was published in Latin in 1505, and in German in 1508. Geographers presumably came to the conclusion that Alberico had given the name America not merely to a single hill or mountain,

but to the entire country.

"When the first map of the continent bearing the title 'Provinre of America,' was published in Barcelona, in 1522, Columbus and his companions were long dead, and there was no one to protest against the misuse of the name. Furthermore, there was no one in all Europe who bore the name Amerigo, and as Vespucci's name was Alberico, geographers and historians would surely have given the new continent this name if they had desired to honor him in this far ion.

"Newly discovered countries were only named after soverigns, as we see in the case of Georgia, Louisiana, Maryland and the Philippines, and when explorers did give names to countries they selected those of their own families, as we see in the cast of Vancouver and Magellan. The origin of such places as Columbia, Columbus and Colon can also be clearly traced."

him on the defensive, and you have the advantage." Except that Farragut's theory has been proved right in all great naval campaigns, there is no reason why all our naval commanders should come from the same mold; least of all they should look alike.
