# **GOVERNMENT'S WAR POLICY**

Great Meeting in old London, Where Resolution Expressing Entire Confidence in the Government was Enthusiastically Adopted

Terrible Head-on Collision of the Chicago and Alton

Passenger Train Crashed Into a Freight -Many Killed and Seriously

Injured. Kansas City, Mo., July 10.-Chicago and Alton passenger train No. 7, west-bound, from Chicago, collided head on to-day, with the second section of freight train No. 88, going east, near Norton, Mo., 100 miles east of Kansas City.

Eight people were killed outright. and about 25 more or less injured. In a fire that started from the demolished engines the dining car and one chair car were partially burned. It is feared other victims are in the wreck. The casualty list, as far as known, is as follows :-

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#### CHINESE CONVERTS

They are Accused of Plundering and Extortion-Other Oriental

Pekin, July 10. - The Protestant missionaries here have received a letter from Chou Fa, special commissioner on the missionary question, in which he accuses Chinese converts of seeking revenge by violence and of plundering and extortion. He concludes by asking the missionaries to assist in the restoration of order.

SOLDIERS JOIN BANDITS.

It is stated that the Chinese soldiers have combined with the bandits to plunder the people and resist the Russians. It appears that no control is exercised over the Chinese soldiery

RUSSIA'S RAILWAY.

It is reported that the Russians are completing the Manchurian railway, and that they will employ 50,000 troops for the defense of the line. Li Hung Chang proposes to withdraw all the Chinese troops from Manchuria, with the object of avoiding all chances of a collision with the Russians. If this is done Russian troops will be neededa to preserve order in the province, as only Chinese policemen will be employed there, according to the definition now given to the Russo-Chinese agreement regarding Manchuria.

#### SWEPT AWAY

Town of La Vaca, Texas, Des stroyed by a Terrible

Austin, Texas, July 10.-Private telegrams state that Port La Vaca, a Calhoun county town, was swept away last night by a storm. Nearly all the houses were blown away, and a large number of boats were wreck-

ed, but no lives are known to have been lost. La Vaca is on La Vaca Bay, Gulf of Mexico.

Dallas, Texas, July 10.—It is report-ed that Port La Vaca, on La Vaca Bay, has been destroyed by a gulf storm. No details have been received as to loss of life, but is is feared it is heavy. Wire communications with that part of the coast is entirely cut off.
