CANADA AT CORK.

grellent Display Made by the Demini at the Irish City-A Striking and Beaut f. | Pavilion.

The Canadian Government Las milding of its own, which is one o the most striking and beautiful on he grounds, and is placed on the ho'cest site at the entrance to the western grounds, facing the river Lee, ays the Cork (Ireland) Constitution. the pavilion (which covers an area of 5,000 square feet) is rectangular n plan, and is flanked by two towers at each end, which give it a very imposing and dignified effect, their propo tions and symmetry being particula ly striking. The main trance is very effectively dealt with

The frst object to claim attention taining a great variety of leading brands of Canadian food products con isting of meat, fruit and vegend lun h tongues, potted meats, sau sage, roast meats, etc.; raspberries, strawlerries, cherries, damson plums green ages, currants, Bartlett pears, Craw ord peaches, egg plums, apples etc., wax string beans, petit pois, tomatoes, sweet corn, cauliflower, beets, baked beans, tomato catsup, etc. These cases also contain pyra-mids of "Radnor" mineral water, and Canada's 'Club" Rye Whiskey as well as Imperial cheese, honey, beaver oats, and Swiss food. The whole of the eastern side of the building is devoted to agriculture, and one is struck with admiration at the beautiful display of cereals, both grain in straw and in bottles, former being elaborately set up in arches, pyramids, sheaves, bunches, festooned and wreathed meny varied and artistic forms. also forms the frames of a series oil paintings which appeal strongly to the imag nation, showing such cenes as seed-time, harvest and threshing operations in the Canadian Northwest. Between these paintings, on small stands erected for the pur ose, as well as round each pillar, re hundreds of bottles of all shapes nd sizes, containing specimens of h at, oats, barley, rye, Italian orn, peas, flax, millet, buckwheat, of grain, grasses, and fodder which nd, in fact, all the leading varieties grow to such perfection in Canada The collection contains thousands of amples, comprising over 500 differnt varieties, and the exhibit is un-'oubtedly the best of the kind ever seen in this country. It cannot fail o impress everyone who sees it with he fact that Canada is a country rich in agricultural resources of al-

most endless variety. Returning to the centre we find immediately behind the large case already referred to, a display of Canada's varied luscious fruit. These are grapes, plums, raspberries, blueberries, cherries, etc , also some samples of peas, string beans, Windsor beans, Around these are placed about 150 plates (containing specimens in their natural condition) of about 35 aricties of Canadian apples, picked ast October, and which have since e n preserved in cold storage. Adoining this is the cold storage chamer which is kept at a temperature of about 34 degrees, and in which are o be found Canadian cheese, both white and colored, butter, eggs, apdes in cases, dressed poultry, maple

near, honey, etc. The western side is devoted to timper and minerals. The timber exhibit shows all the leading varieties of wood, especially those most suitable for export, such as pine (white, ellow and red), spruce, birch, oak ich, elm, and numerous other varieies which it is needless for us to uention here, as Canada's production of this article is already sufficiently well known to need further comment out we cannot leave this section without making a reference to the fine display di photographs showing he various trees, each photograph being framed in the wood of the tree epresented. There is also a very ne series of photographs illustrating

umbering operations. Passing on to the minerals, we have specimens of almost every snown mineral in existence, with the exception of tin. as Canada can produce a larger variety of minerals than any other country in the world The list is almost too varied to attempt to enumerate it. We will, therefore, content ourselves with saying there are silver ores, gold ores, quartz, felspar, mica, asbestos and o undum, the latter being one of the minerals which is, so far, to be o nd in no other country.
