THE KENT FARMER

Several esteemed Kent county farmers have called on The Planet during the last week, asking this journal to take cognizance of the irresponsible, untruthful and sneering editorial comments on their calling which recently appeared in the Banner.

The following are the Grand Jurors: Solomon Coffell, Chatham Township; Douglas Crawford, Dover; Alexis Robert, Chatham Township; E. S. Hubbell, Thamesville; Hugh Macaulay, city, foreman; Robert McNaughton, Harwich; H. Pangburn, Howard; Joseph Rhody, Howard; J. H. Shary, Camden; Ernest Suseby, Romney; Geo. T. Sales, Tilbury East; David Toll, Raleigh; W. H. Waters, Ridgetown.

However, it does appear that this latest eruption is of too serious a character to be passed over with the customary indulgent contempt. It is of too scurrilous and slanderous a character upon the reputation and calling of many of our most esteemed and honored people.

Of our Kent county farmers the Banner says:—
"It is probable that the farmer himself is largely to blame for this shyness of labor for farm life. Not only is the farmer himself a drudge as well as a hard task-master, but all about him, not excluding the members of his own family, are reduced practically to a condition of industrial slavery. Of all industrial drudges the rural hired man is probably the most miserable outside of Siberia. When he is not working he is sleeping. For at least seven or eight months a year he works on an average 16 hours a day. At the peak of dawn he is up to do his 'chores,' a quarter day's work sometimes being done before the morning meal. Breakfast bolted he craves his team afield, not in 'jocund' mood, as Gray's pretty pastoral picture puts it more poetically than truthfully, but in the spirit of a man whose lot is only a little higher than the beasts he drives—a man without social hope or outlook. His field work done and the last meal swallowed, more chores, lasting well on till bedtime. He is too tired to read—in fact cannot afford to allow his sleeping hours to be trampled on by any such indulgence—and he seeks repose. There are exceptions, of course, but this is the average condition of the farm hand while his remuneration is a beggarly pittance, precluding any saving, excepting by depriving himself of actual necessities.

"Is it any wonder that the laborer avoids the farm and seeks less exacting conditions? Not until the farmer treats his hired man at least equal to his domestic animals, will the last bar famine be relieved."

Anyone who has travelled through our splendid and productive farming country and viewed the happy, pros-

perous homes, the energetic and enterprising people, the wholesome and contented households and the grand spirit of fellowship that unites employer and employee, can adequately brand for himself the Banner's malicious, untruthful and insulting outbreak against our county residents. Would to heaven the same happy industrial conditions they experience existed in all the urban municipalities!
