From information received from home he states his loss will be about \$3,000, and not \$15,000 to \$20,000, as told in the newspaper despatches. 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## ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

No Redistribution Law Will Be Introduced Says Premier.

Neither is There to Be a Salary Grab at the Coming Session of the Legislature—Speech From the Throne Approved by the Lieutenant-Governor—No Insurance Legislation in Sight—Hon. Mr. Cochrane Sworn In.

Toronto, Feb. 14.—Premier Whitney stated plainly last night that there will be no redistribution legislation brought up at the coming session at all. It has not even been thought of. The Government feels pretty well satisfied with the way things are.

Mr. Whitney also denied the rumor that there is to be a move for the increase of the seasonal indemnity to members. The matter has not been discussed by the Cabinet, and there are no signs of a salary grab looming up so far for the coming session.

The Speech From the Throne was read last night by His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Clark, and is now in the hands of the printers.

Everything is in readiness for the opening to-day. The Legislative Chamber has been neatly tidied, and the opening will be a fine function. Many invitations have been issued.

**No Insurance Legislation Yet.**

Speaking of possible insurance legislation on the lines of cutting out rebates, suggested recently to the Government, Hon. J. J. Foy, Attorney-General, remarked last evening that he had not yet brought the matter up before the Cabinet-in-Council, and he would not suggest what action he would recommend.

**Hon. Mr. Cochrane Sworn In.**

Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Lands and Mines, will sit in the House for the first time to-day. After the opening ceremony Premier Whitney will introduce Mr. Cochrane to the Legislature. Yesterday Mr. Cochrane took the oath of allegiance before Col. Clark, clerk of the Legislative Assembly, as the new member for East Nipissing, and he signed the roll. He was elected by acclamation June 13 last year.

E. J. B. Pense, M. P. P., will also be introduced to the House on retaking his seat, which he won in the recent by-election in Kingston.

### HEAVY SUCCESSION DUES.

Big Amounts Soon to Be Received By Provincial Treasury.

Toronto, Feb. 14.—Mr. J. B. McLeod, Solicitor to the Provincial Treasury, has received details of the estate of the late T. R. Wood of Toronto. It is valued at about \$1,300,000, and is practically divided between two sons. Consequently the succession duties will be on a basis of 7 1/2 per cent, and the Provincial Treasury will benefit to the extent of \$90,000.

The late Mrs. A. E. Ross, a Canadian lady who died in England, left an estate aggregating \$700,000, mostly in Toronto realty. Until further information is to hand the amount to be received from this estate cannot be estimated.

From the estate of the late T. R. Merritt, St. Catharines, the Province will receive \$31,000. The estate has been probated at \$560,000.

**North Toronto Nominations.**

Toronto, Feb. 14.—To-morrow nominations will be received officially for contesting the riding of North Toronto. To-night both the Conservative and Liberal parties will hold nominating conventions to decide their own choice.

Last night the local Socialist party nominated James Simpson.

Referring President Miles was elected honorary president, in place of the late Senator Fulford.

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
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### STARTS UP
