A number of his kind-hearted neighbors turned out in their teams and assisted him in laying in his winter's wood. Mr. Harris wishes through the ACADIAN to return thanks.

During the past week two estimable citizens of Hayton Landing have passed away. On Thursday evening of last week Capt. Theo. Tisdale while sitting in his chair, having just finished some outdoor work. Capt. Charles Curry was stricken with paralysis on Friday last and died Tuesday morning. Both gentlemen were held in high regard. Capt. Taso was president of the Kings County Agricultural Society for many years.

Margeson's Block, Kentville, caught fire last Monday evening, and before the flames could be extinguished, the two upper stories were destroyed. The building was owned by J. W. Margeson, and occupied by F. W. Margeson, dry goods, and W. J. Grosz, merchant tailor. The top story was utilized as a public hall. There was \$2,000 on the building, over \$5,000 on F. Margeson's stock, and \$700 on Grosz's stock. W. H. Chase, of this town, had about one hundred and fifty barrels of apples stored in the cellar of the building, but they were saved.
