Elora Correspondence.

REWARD.—Yesterday a fine horse owned by Geo. Milgates, Elora, started with a sleigh from the front of the market house and ran sharply through the streets of the village. Passing Dalby's stables the sleigh ran over and killed a valuable cocker spaniel, the property of Mr. F. Dalby, when in contact with the corner of a house, and went for a considerable distance before being brought to a stop. The sleigh was badly broken but the horse escaped uninjured.

XMAS DAY.—The twenty-fifth passed off quietly, but was nevertheless seasonably observed in the majority of households in this locality. The intense cold, and the want of sleighing, although the roads were smooth and fit for buggy driving, prevented the usual throng of pleasure-seeking citizens. Sleighbells seemed so near and was yet so far, that young folks were bitterly disappointed at the non-existence of the season.

NOMINATIONS.—The nominations for Elora, Pilkington and Nichol came off yesterday and were well attended. That for Nichol took place in Elora and resulted in the unanimous election of the old Reeve and Councillors, everybody seeming well satisfied with the doings of those who rule the destinies of one of the best governed townships in the Province. In Elora nominations were held in the town hall, and after the usual hour for electing a Reeve, the following gentlemen were nominated: J. P. Smith, Esq., the retiring Reeve, was re-elected by acclamation. The retiring Councillors were re-nominated, and consist of Messrs F. Clarke, Hugh Clark, J. Wells and W. Campbell. They are to be opposed, the following gentlemen having been nominated for the purpose: Messrs E. Golden, an ex-Councillor, G. Noble, T. Lipsey and Jas. McCabe. Mr. Geo. Noble will probably not be in the poll, but the other gentlemen will solicit the suffrage of their fellow electors. The fight will undoubtedly be a keen one. For school trustees Messrs G. Noble and W. Shepherd were re-nominated, and the following gentlemen were also placed before the electors: Messrs W. Lambert, F. Dalby, J. Bows, John Blair and S. Springer. From amongst the whole nomination there will be no difficulty in electing a good man.

ELECTIONS.—The election of members in the Army hall, Elora, and the following nominations were made: For Reeve, W. L. Gordon; for Councillors, J. P. Smith, Deputy Reeve, Thos. Cleghorn and Chas. Nicklin; for councillors, Wm. Waddell, Wm. Thaksher and Robt. Bottomworth; for school trustees, Josiah Ford and Thos. O'Brien. After the nominations a lengthy discussion took place, and sharp words were indulged in before the electors were induced to meet on Monday next the best men shall win. Mr. Robert Ford was elected Reeve, and Thos. O'Brien, declined to enter into a contest at the present time.

SAD DEATH.—There was mourning in one household in Elora on Christmas day. Mr. Thomas Blinco, of Manitowish, who came here some months ago to attend the remains of his father to the tomb, contracted a bad cold on the journey, and although he returned to his home in the Western Province, felt that his days were numbered, and came back to Elora to die. He had prospered in his business, and having become proprietor of a large livery business there, but was not destined to reap the fruits of his energy and enterprise. He passed quietly away, and was buried on Saturday last in Elora cemetery. He had entered his thirty-sixth year and was a devoted husband and father. His mother in this second bereavement within the year has the sympathy of the whole neighborhood.

AGONY.—William, eldest son of Mr. George Nichol, died last evening, the victim of consumption, after a long illness, which he bore with exemplary patience and becoming resignation. A mild and amiable man, and one of those who won the esteem of a large circle of acquaintances, and dies regretted by many hearts. He had been in the hospital when death claimed him. His loss will be much felt in the household from which he has been taken.

A BIG HARE.—Mr. Tompkins, of Elora, while out shooting on Saturday last, knocked over a hare which nearly turned the scale at five pounds, and was certainly one of the largest killed in this locality during the present season.

EXAGGERATED.—Miss Maggie Halley, of Elora, who recently returned from a term of teaching in the township of Biddeford, has been engaged as teacher in the second department of the public school in Penetanguishene.

A LITTLE OUT.—The Canadian Almanac for 1890, published by the Elora Press, states that Elora is 98 and Ferguson 101 miles from Toronto. By G. T. Bigelow, it is 63 miles from Toronto and Ferguson 65 by G. T. Bigelow. Elora is 75 miles and Ferguson 73 miles. And this valuable information is said to be copyrighted, and all rights are reserved. The railroad officials announce that so far as the Caledonian is concerned the strike is ended. The Glasgow & Southwestern Railway has reinstated many of its men, and this action is thought likely to cause a stampede of the strikers.

NEWS RECORDS.

The Late Mr. George Anderson.

(From our Correspondent.)

You announced on Saturday the somewhat sudden and unexpected death of Mr. George Anderson, grain merchant, of Hamilton, who was so well and favorably known to the city and county from his long business career in the same. Mr. Anderson fell slightly unwell on Sunday, the 21st on the following two days no serious consequences were feared. On Wednesday, however, Mr. Anderson became much worse and Dr. Henrivas called in, when it was found that he was suffering from congestion of the lungs. On Friday morning his medical attendant feared the result and Dr. Groves of Ferguson, was telegraphed for. When he arrived in the afternoon a consultation was held with him and Dr. Henrivas. About 9 o'clock that evening the old gentleman, surrounded by the most of his family, passed peacefully away.

Mr. Anderson was born in Kinross, Scotland, May 5th, 1820, spending his younger days on his father's farm. Having decided to go into business he opened out in the city of Duferin, where he carried on a successful business all the fall of 1855, when he emigrated to Canada. Through the influence of some of the directors of the G. W. R., he was induced to accept a position on the staff at Hamilton. When the line was opened to Guelph he was appointed station master. After a few years he left the Railway Company and commenced business as a grain and produce dealer in Guelph, where for many years he carried it on on a very extensive scale, and at one time was looked upon as one of the largest dealers in Canada, his trade extending to foreign ports.

When the W. G. & B. Ry was built north of Guelph the grain trade was not so large as it was in the Northern Counties. He then opened up warehouses at Cliford, Dryton, Tarr, and Hamilton. He is said to have been largely interested in land in Huron and near Hamilton, and settled down in the latter place and continued the grain business all his life.

His disposition was such that he gained him many friends and he was always ready to do a good turn to anybody in need. He never aspired to any public office, although he had often been solicited. He was in political and religious connection a member of the Presbyterian church, and a devoted Christian, a cheerful, intelligent citizen, a good and honest business man, and one who will be much missed where he lived. He leaves a family of four daughters and one son—Mrs. James Millar, Guelph; Mrs. George Gray, Hamilton; Mrs. H. Lamont, Cliford; Miss Jeanie; and George Anderson, Jr., of Toronto.

The funeral took place on Saturday, and was largely attended by friends from Toronto, Hamilton, Guelph, Walkerton, Paisley, Chesley, Cliford, Mount Forest, and other places in the immediate vicinity. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Cameron, assisted by Rev. J. Johnston, of Paisley. The pallbearers were—Messrs A. McCreedy, Dr. Hamilton, O. Donaldson, of Hamilton; James Park, Toronto; John Thomson, Hamilton; Alex. Johnston, Hamilton. Out of respect to the memory of the deceased the town hall was tolled during the time of the funeral. There were numerous wreaths and flowers from Guelph, Toronto, and Walkerton. Judging by the large number of farmers with whom he had done business who were at the funeral, he was favorably known generally. A. B. Allan, M. P., and J. McMillan, M. P., were present to show their last respect to the deceased.

Mr. Anderson, especially, and the other members of the family have the sympathy of the community in their sad bereavement.

SHELburne, Dec. 30.—What may prove a serious stabbing affray occurred here in the Salvation Army Barracks last night. It appears that one Stephen Cole in a row drew a knife and stabbed Harry Sanderson, a member of the same. He was promptly arrested by Constable Canning and placed in the lock up here. He was brought before Reeve July on Monday morning, J. P. this afternoon, and pleaded guilty, but afterwards withdrew the plea and offered one of no guilty. Cole was committed to Orangeville jail to await his trial.

The Cattle Export Trade.

MONTREAL, Dec. 30.—Mr. Emili, Deputy Minister of Marine, telegraphed this afternoon to the Dominion line stating that the investigation into the export cattle trade would commence next Monday morning at 10 o'clock in the Harbor Commission office at Montreal. Finally will be confronted with formidable statements and figures which will show that the Canadian cattle trade should not be summarily exterminated.

The Hunley Murder.

STEVENSVILLE, Dec. 30.—The coroner's inquest on the body of Richard Langford, killed in Hunley, opened at Manchester today, and after a number of witnesses had given evidence, the jury brought in a verdict of willful murder against George Goodwin.
