Noble will probably not go to the poll,

but the other gentlemen will solicit the

support of their fellow electors. The

fight will undoubtedly be a keen one. For

school trustees in the three townships

trusting Messrs G. Noble and W. Shep-

herd were re-nominated, and the following

gentlemen were also placed before the

electors: Messrs W. Lamb, F. Dalby,

Bowes, John Mair and S. Springer. From

amongst the whole nomination there will

be no difficulty in electing the best men.

The Late Mr. George Anderson.

You announced on Saturday the some-

what sudden and unexpected death of

Mr. Geo. Anderson, grain merchant, of

Hamilton, who was so well and favorably

known to the city and county from his

long business career in the name. Mr

Anderson felt slightly unwell on Sunday,

the 21st, on the following two days no

serious consequences were feared. On

Wednesday, however, he came much worse

and Dr. Henry was called in, when it was

found that he was suffering from congestion

of the lungs. On Friday morning his medical

attendant feared the result and Dr. Groves, of

Fergus, was telegraphed for. When he arrived

in the afternoon a consultation was held

and it was decided to give him a dose of

about 9 o'clock that evening the old gentleman, sur-

rounded by the most of his family, passed

peacefully away.

The deceased was born in Kinross, Scotland,

May 5th, 1820, spending his younger

days on his father's farm. Having desired

to go into business he came out to the

city of Hamilton, where he carried on a

successful business till the fall of 1865,

when he emigrated to Canada. Through the

influence of some of the directors of the

G. W. R., he was induced to accept a position

on the staff at Hamilton. He was ap-

pointed station master. After a few years

he left the Railway Company and com-

menced business as a dealer in grain and

produce. He was a very extensive dealer,

and at one time was looked upon as one of

the largest dealers in Canada, his trade

extending to foreign ports.

When the W. & G. Ry was built north

of Guelph the grain trade was held out

to a large extent to the Northern Counties.

He then opened up warehouses at Cliford,

Drayton, and Fergus. He was also in-

terested in land in Huron and near

Hamilton, and settled down in the latter

place and continued the grain business

till his death.

His disposition was such that gained him

many friends and he was always ready

to do a good turn to anyone who would

ask his assistance. He was a public officer,

although he had never held office. He was

in politics a Conservative, and a member

of the Presbyterian church, and a devoted

Christian. He was a good and honest
