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PERTH'S NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

Pert's new school building now in course of construction will be modern in its planning and convenient in its appointments. It certainly will be a source of personal pride to every resident of the town. Subsequent to the placing of a contract for this building, a proposition for the consolidation of Andover and Perth districts was agitated but strong opposition sentiment in Perth defeated this scheme and immediately plans were consummated whereby the towns will soon possess creditable and commodious accommodation for the children of the district.

The contract for the work was awarded to Charles Hanson, a well known and successful builder and contractor. A force of masons and carpenters have been at work for some time and considerable work has already been done. The site selected for the building is a beautifully located lot in the lower part of the town. The lot, considerably over an acre in size is ideal as a play ground, level and sufficiently large for all school boy games. According to the contract plan the building is to be 56 feet by 67 feet with one story and basement. The basement will have a height of 9 feet, 5 feet 8 inches from the foundation up being concrete. Surrounding this is a well laid up distance of 3 feet 4 inches, with hollow concrete blocks. The upper portion or main building is to be of wood, with the roof finished in metal.

The basement will contain two large rooms, one to be devoted to the furnace and a store room, while in the other will be installed a complete equipment of modern and sanitary toilet appliances.

The main structure will be devoted entirely to the accommodation of instructors and pupils and will contain, in addition to the necessary entry halls and cloak rooms, four spacious and well lighted class rooms. The outside will have a clapboard finish while the finish of the interior will be in plaster and native birch. When completed this building will represent an outlay of some \$7000 over and above the purchase price of the site, which, from its location, is in itself a valuable asset to the district.
