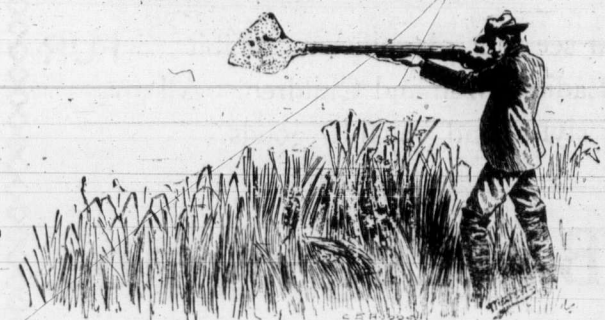

THE CLERGUE WORKS.

The Great Promoter Now in England Trying to Interest Capitalists!

In the Immense Works Associated With His Name at Sault Ste. Marie.

LIKELY TO BE SUCCESSFUL.

TORONTO, Nov. 4.—Mr. F. H. Clergue and Mr. Harvey, who are endeavoring to secure capital for the rehabilitation of the S. S. works, arrived in England yesterday, according to advices received in Toronto. Their visit to the old land is for the purpose of interviewing the English capitalists who recently visited the S. S. to inspect the works. There seems to be a pretty fair prospect that the mission

of Messrs. Clergue and Harvey will be successful, as they had not intended going to England unless the negotiations had made some definite headway. H. O. Hamilton, solicitor to the Lake Superior Consolidated Co., is now at the King Edward awaiting information from Mr. Clergue. He expresses himself as confident that English capital will eventually be induced to take hold of the enterprise.

KILLED BY LIVE WIRE.

Instantaneous Death of a Lineman at Ottawa.

Was Laying Wire for the Electric Company.

When It Came In Contact With Wire of Another Company.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—A lineman named Sarazon in the employ of the Ottawa Electric Co. met with sudden death by electrocution this morning. He was stringing wires at the corner of Albert and O'Connor streets, standing on the ground pulling wires over the cross tree of the pole, when his wire came in contact with the live wires of other companies. The current immediately was diverted and seeking the nearest way to the earth passed down the loose wire and through Sarazon, producing instantaneous death.

A FOOLISH JOKER.

Might Have Caused a Fatality at Hamilton, Ontario.

HAMILTON, Ont., Nov. 4.—James Binkley received a very serious note, signed "Bill," asking him to meet the writer at Keagey's gate on the mountain road last night. Arriving himself with a revolver he went to the appointed spot. Soon afterwards, two young fellows came along and paused, whereupon Binkley without waiting to investigate any further fired two shots at them. Fortunately the shots went wide. The young men, it turned out, had both received notes similar to the one received by Binkley.

BANK CLEARINGS.

Statistics at Montreal for October and Last Ten Months of Year.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.—Bank clearings in the city of Montreal for the month of October show a decrease of \$7,390,123 over the same month last year. The figures are: October, 1902, \$107,848,849; October, 1903, \$100,458,726. Clearings for the ten months ending October 31st, however, show an increase of \$9,201,901, as follows: Ten months, ending October 31st, 1903, \$927,128,087; ten months ending October 31st, 1902, \$917,926,186.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Young Lady Found Dead in Bed at Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 4.—Miss McAllister of Selkirk Avenue, daughter of A. McAllister, city sanitary inspector, died suddenly in bed during Monday night. The first intimation her relations had of her death was an investigation after her failure to come down to breakfast yesterday.

AT OTTAWA.

Movements of Members of The Cabinet—Those in Town.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—The number of the ministers in the capital is fast approaching the normal number for the recess. Mr. Fielding left for Moncton on the Intercolonial business today. Mr. Templeman goes west tomorrow. At present Messrs. Scott, Sutherland and Cartwright are in town.

WINTER SHIPMENT OF WHEAT.

Portland Will Not Have as Much Canadian Wheat

This Winter as It Has Done in the Past.

The Reason Advanced by a Prominent G. T. R. Official.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.—The prospects at present are that Canadian shipments through Portland this winter will be smaller than for some years past. At any rate the prospects for traffic are not so bright as twelve months ago. A. F. Reed, foreign freight agent of the G. T. R., attributes the falling away largely to the fact that the millers throughout Manitoba and the North West can pay a much larger figure for wheat than the exporter can afford to give. The foreign demand is not such as to induce large exportations with an assurance of good profits.

CANADIAN STOCK MARKET.

Good Sales on the Montreal Exchange This Morning.

Races Were Generally a Little Higher Than Yesterday.

Canadian Pacific Sold at 119 and Dominion Iron at 8 1/2.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.—A good demand for stocks sent prices generally higher, but on realizing sales later in the day prices reacted from the best. Some of the principal prices were: Canadian Pacific 119, Power 77 1/2 to 77, Richelieu 80 to 81, Twin City 88 to 89, Dominion Coal 76 1/2 to 77, Dominion Iron 8 1/2, Halifax Tram 92, Nova Scotia Steel 76 1/2 to 77.

FORGERS AT WORK.

BRANDON, Nov. 4.—Several merchants in Brandon have been victimized by forged checks bearing local contractors names. The forgers are supposed to belong to a gang of returning harvesters and are still at large.

NARROW ESCAPE

Of Train from British Columbia Going In to the Fraser River.

NELSON, B. C., Nov. 4.—Passengers arriving last night from the coast give details of a marvellous escape of their train from destruction on Sunday night last. Shortly after leaving North Bend the train, crowded with passengers, ran into a big log, which had rolled from the mountain. The engineer immediately stopped the train to ascertain what damage had been done. The engine's tender was out on a high trestle over a canyon a few feet from the Fraser River. The trainmen had partially got off when the bridge collapsed, taking the engine with it into the Fraser River. Had it not been for the log the train would have gone with the engine. The passengers presented an address and diamond lockets to the engineer and fireman for their prompt action.
