Montreal, May 31.—In the Superior Court before Judge Archibald, Mrs. Raoul Boret and Louis Boret are suing the Ottawa River Navigation Company. On the 26th Sept., 1906, plaintiff's alleged Raoul Boret was a passenger on the Maude, when it collided with the Ottawa on the Lake of the Two Mountains, a collision in which Boret was drowned. Damages are estimated at \$5,000.

FACTORY AT BATHURST BURNED.

George F. Eddy Loses His Valuable Woodworking Establishment And Stock.

NO INSURANCE.

Much Lumber Goes Up In Smoke. Loss From \$12,000 to \$15,000.

Bathurst, N. B., May 30.—Fire yesterday morning was discovered in the woodworking factory of Geo. F. Eddy, near the old shipyard property at the eastern end of this town. Owing to a large quantity of inflammable material, fanned by a heavy northeast wind, the fire burned with great fierceness, totally destroying the mill's contents, the kiln filled with valuable hard wood lumber, and a large quantity of lumber in the yard. The mill was quite a large one and fitted up with modern machinery. The loss is estimated at between \$12,000 and \$15,000. There was no insurance.
