Infant twins of Mrs. Allison died Infant twins of Mrs. Allison died on Christmas Day and an undertaker was called in to embalm their bodies. A highly poisonous fluid was used. The bottle was only half emptied when the undertaker's assistant accidentally overturned it and its contents spilled into a wooden sluk, the lower portion of which was used as a cupboard. In this cupboard was a box of soft candly that had been bought for the twins, but unused on account of the sudden and fatal iliness. The poison ran through a crack in the sink and saturated the candy.

The funeral of the children took place yesterday. When the mourners returned home the candy was passed around. Several persons ate some of it, and in a moment all were screaming from pain.

Mrs. Noffsker, Mrs. Allison and the lekes sisters lost consciousness. Their tongues and tonsils were almost destroyed by the acid and physicians were unable to relieve their sufferings except by administration of powerful marcotics; nor could the victims be restored to consciousness. Others who ate of the candy are suffering from burned mouths, but they are expected to recover.

PRATTLE OF WAR

From Venezueia.

London, Dec. 30.—Commenting on the London Times' statement from Washington, that persons of considerable importance in official circles there profess to believe that war between the United States and Germany is inevitable, the St. James Gazette, though it does not believe that such a disaster will be allowed to occur over a dispute in regard to the debts of Venezueia to Germany, says that if it does, there can be no doubt that English sympathies will be with America. At the same time the St. James Gazette expresses the hope that the U. S. will not allow such states as Venezueia to gain the impression that they can reckon on the protection of Monroelism if they chose to repudiate their obligations to Europe.

COSTLY CHRISTMAS TREE.

Derby, Conn., Dec. 30. — Because Frederick Yocher went into Mount St. Peter's Cemetery on Tuesday evening, cut down a Norwegian spruce and took it to his home to surprise and make his two children happy with a Christmas tree, he was to-day sentenced to pay a fine, with court costs, amounting to \$131.42, and to serve six months in jail. He was taken to jail this afternoon, and under the Connecticut system of allowing prisoners to work out fees and costs, will have to remain there about 443 days.

Tacoma, Wa., Dec. 30.—According to advices from the Orient, a party of 105 coolies engaged in transporting camphor, was attacked by Formosan insurgents late in November, and tweaty of them killed. Nineteen were decapitated.

Japanese troops and police were sent against the rebels. A pitched battle took place, in which more than 100 were killed, the heaviest losses being on the side of the rebels.
