## Legislature to Meet Their Financial Difficulties.

Toronto, Ont., Feb. 6 .- (Special.) -No tice has been given by Hon. Dr. Reaume, Minister of Public Works, of a bill to amend the Act respecting local municipal amend the Act respecting local municipal telephone systems. The measure is intended to meet financial difficulties which have arisen in connection with the establishment of these systems. The law as it now stands allows the municipalities to divide the expenses of telephone plants among the subscribers. It was found, however, that there was no provision for making disbursements on capital account. Dr. Keaume's amendment will, it is said, allow the municipalities ital account. Dr. Keaume's amendment will, it is said, allow the municipalities to issue debentures to meet the expendi-tures on poles, wires, switches, etc., and spread the payment over a period of years.
