

LIGHT WORK FOR PLATERS.

Little Doing at the Woodbine Track This Morning. Big Fields For First Day of the Meeting. Hamilton Lacrosse Club Will Send Strong Team to St. Kitts.

Toronto, May 22.—(By the Times' clock)—There was not much work done this morning, as the horses who will start to-morrow were only breezed. The first of the Platers on the track were those from the Valley Farm string. This trio were given a light gallop, and breezed through the stretch. The Seagram bunch was the next out. Trainer Littlefield spent his time in schooling them at the barriers. Half a Crown is a good breaker, and will have this to his advantage. The pair from the Boyle stable were only galloped and walked this morning.

John Dymont gave Uncle Toby his final work for the race in the Woodstock Plate, to be run on Monday. This horse stepped the circuit of the track in 1.48, going on the mile and a quarter in 2.18. Throckmorton, who will be the contender, was given a gallop and breeze through the stretch. That is about all the work the Seagram horses were asked to do. Handmud was sent half a mile in 33 seconds. Maud Sigby was sent the three-eighths in 41 seconds. Elliott was sent three-quarters in 1.18. This horse does not seem to be ready to race in any of the stakes, and will likely be withdrawn from them. Simcoe, who was rested up for the last couple of weeks, is all right again. QUEBEC BRIDGE.

Secretary of Humber Bridge Co. to Appear Before Committee. Ottawa, Ont., May 22.—The special committee of the Commons appointed to inquire into the conditions under which the Government paid money to the Quebec Bridge Company or guaranteed their bonds, and measures taken to ensure proper plans for construction of the bridge, held their first meeting to-day. Mr. A. K. Maclean, Linnenger, was appointed chairman. On motion of Mr. Mackenzie King, secretary of the Humber Bridge Company, to appear at the next meeting with the company's book of minutes, accounts, contracts with regard to work of construction, contracts for loans and advances, and all papers relating to matter referred to the committee for consideration. It was also agreed to obtain before the next sitting all the papers in possession of the Government relating to the bridge company. The committee adjourned until Tuesday, June 2.
