The daughter and friends of the family could only account for Mrs. Loeschauer's state of health by worry over the death of her husband, which occurred two years ago, shortly after her only son Charles had been drowned. The shock from these deaths she felt severely at the time, and gradually her mental faculties became affected.

Mrs. Loeschauer lived alone with her only surviving child, the daughter Lena.
