DISEMBOWELED.  
Woman Kills Herself With Butcher Knife.

Loss of Husband and Son Had Unhinged Her Mind.

North Tonaawaga, March 3.—When Lena Loeschauer returned to her home at 394 Schenck street at 8:30 o'clock this evening she was unable to gain an entrance, the doors both at the front and back of the house and the lower windows being locked. Fearing some harm had befallen her mother, whom she had left in fairly good spirits about two hours previously, she summoned neighbors, who climbed into the home through an upper window, and they found the girl's mother, Mrs. Vrazen Loeschauer, dismembered and dead on the floor of her bedroom, the woman evidently having hacked herself frantically and determinedly with a butcher knife and dirk, both of which lay by her.

Corner Martin will hold an inquest, but he seemed satisfied from what he learned that it was a case of suicide. Mrs. Loeschauer, who was 67 years of age, has been subject to sudden and violent fits of nervous prostration and mental depression for some time, the fits recurring at varying intervals, but increasing in intensity at each. The daughter and friends of the family could only account for Mrs. Loeschauer's state of health by worry over the death of her husband, which occurred two years ago, shortly after her only son Charles had been drowned. The shock from these deaths she felt severely at the time, and gradually her mental faculties became affected.

Mrs. Loeschauer lived with her only surviving child, the daughter Lena.

SIX NATIONS INDIAN'S WILL.  
Indian Girl No Longer One When She Marries White Man.

Temperance People to Buy Hotel at St. George.

Tom and Mrs. Longboat Visiting Indian Reservation.

(Special Despatch to the Times.)  
Brantford, March 4.—A peculiar case was settled by the Six Nations Indian Council yesterday, when the will of the late Joshua Williams, who was ferryman at Oshweken for many years, was set aside. Williams, who was an Indian, had no family of his own, but adopted a white boy, who afterwards married an Indian girl. It was to the young wife that he left his 200 acres of farm land on the reserve, his ferry and a snug sum of money. The chiefs in council voted that the terms of the will were void because by marrying a white man, the Indian girl was no longer Indian. The case is one of the most peculiar that has arisen in a long time, and the decision reached will have to be confirmed by the department at Ottawa.

UP IN ARMS.  
Local merchants whose places of business are situated around the Market Square, which is in the heart of the city, are very much up in arms over the proposal of Ald. Ham to remove the market to a site in front of the Kerby House and sell the Market Square to the Government for building purposes. An application for legislation is now being made at Toronto for that purpose. Several signs are being fought by the opponents of the vested rights. An indignation meeting was held yesterday afternoon, when a strong resolution of censure was passed.

TO BUY HOTEL.  
In view of the general local option campaign for Brant county and Brantford city next January, and in order to present a stronger case, St. George residents have banded themselves together to buy out the Cummings Hotel at St. George and conduct the place along temperance lines. Silas G. Kitchen, J. P. Wood and J. L. Addison, influential citizens, have been appointed a committee to raise the money. Several lists of subscriptions have already been made.

RECOVERED GOODS.  
The late Thomas Boyle, of Hagersville, who was drowned a few days ago in attempting to cross a creek, which was in full flood, with his team of horses, left his estate in an unsettled condition. Immediately on Boyle's death, Indians in the neighborhood arrived and divided up his cattle, horses, implements and farm stock. The relatives of the deceased lived in Toronto, and Constables Kerr and Mounce were called to recover his possessions, which they succeeded in doing. The man left no will, and his heirs will get the estate. It is alleged he had been living apart from his wife, and the Indian woman with whom he lived thought it rightful to make a disposal of the property.

LONGBOAT WELL.  
Tom Longboat, the famous long distance runner, is at present visiting Medical Health Officer Holmes at Oshweken, on the Indian reservation, which is the Indian's birth place. Dr. Holmes states that the Indian never appeared better, and the couple is enjoying a quiet visit. They will come to Brantford on Saturday to renew old acquaintances. Those intimately acquainted with Longboat state that the wily Indian has garnered in \$12,000 from his victories.

GENERAL NOTES.  
Yesterday's heavy snowstorm tied up the Brantford Street Railway and the Grand Valley Radial, from Brantford to Galt.

Three actions for damages, by Bert Holstock, J. Hornby and James Williams will be heard here at the Spring Assizes against the Brantford Gas Company, as a result of last summer's gas explosion. The former two actions are for injuries and loss of life and the latter that property have had to unite in order to secure a supply of ice from the north.

The Brantford Township Board of Health is considering the erection of a hospital for township patients. The Brantford hospital has not sufficient capacity and many county patients are forced to other cities.

Joe Powless was fined \$5 and costs before Squire Howell yesterday on a charge of assaulting his intended wife.

Mrs. Louis Manville, of 70 Clegg street, Ottawa, went to the office of Dr. D. H. Baird on Wednesday to have some teeth extracted. She was given ether and died in the dental chair. She was of a highly nervous temperament.

BY-LAW HOLDS.  
Motion to Quash Toronto License Reduction By-Law Dismissed.

Toronto, March 4.—Chief Justice Meredith yesterday morning in Single Court dismissed two motions to quash the license reduction by-law passed by the City Council of Toronto, on Feb. 15. Mr. A. M. Lewis, of the firm of Lewis & Arrell, Hamilton, represented the petitioner, John Brewer, of the Eastbourne Hotel, Danforth avenue, in what was formerly East Toronto, and Mr. J. B. Mackenzie, for Wm. Robinson, another petitioner.

Mr. Lewis urged that the statute was not followed in the wording of the by-law but his Lordship overruled that objection, and held that the by-law is to remain in force until amended or repealed. Mr. Mackenzie relied on the point that the annexation of East Toronto and Deer Park repealed the by-law, but the Chief Justice could not see how or why this result would follow.

His Lordship spoke of the ingenuity of counsel to find reasons for defeating the by-law as indicating proper vigilance to safeguard the interests of those for whom they were acting, and showing that everything possible had been said against the by-law. The plain purpose of this enactment was written on its face—that it was to apply to the immediate license year. He overruled also the objections that the annexation of East Toronto would repeal the by-law of Toronto. His Lordship overruled Mr. Mackenzie's objection as to the annexation of territory between the first reading and the passing of the by-law, saying he had simply to deal with the by-law as passed on Feb. 15, at which time the Council might have waived all its rules of order, with which, therefore, he had nothing to do, and at that time all the territory referred to was a part of the city of Toronto.

He ruled that the objection on the ground of annexation repealing the by-law must fail. The suggestion that "limit" does not mean "reduce" he dismissed as unworthy considering.

Mr. J. S. Fullerton, K. C., Corporation Counsel, and Mr. W. C. Chisholm, City Solicitor, appeared on behalf of the city.

Both counsel for the petitioners, after his Lordship's judgment, intimated to Mr. Fullerton their intention of appealing from the decision to the Divisional Court. If this course is taken the matter will probably come before the court in from two to four weeks' time.

In Laidlaw vs. Taylor—H. H. Robertson (Hamilton), defendant, appealing from order of Teetzel, J., in chambers, under Rule 603, allowing plaintiff to enter judgment for possession of land, the action being by mortgage against mortgagor, J. H. Spence, for plaintiff, contra. Appeal dismissed with costs.

## GOOD ROADS. TRAIN WRECK.

Many Municipalities Improving Their Highways. Engine Collided With Its Own Train at Merriton.

Toronto, March 4.—Do the people favor the good roads system?  
What results have they produced?  
How much does it cost to put the roads in proper shape?  
What machinery is necessary to do the work at the least possible cost?  
These are a few questions of the very greatest value to the municipalities which have adopted the good roads system in the different parts of the Province. A great deal of valuable information of how the system is progressing was furnished at the opening session of the Ontario Good Roads Association yesterday in the York County Council chamber.

The delegates were honored with the presence of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. J. M. Gibson, who, in formally opening the convention, expressed his appreciation of the good work being done by the association.

Tracing the history of the first system of road-making in Canada, particularly when the old corduroy roads were being much in use, the Lieutenant-Governor said: "When Senator George W. Ross was Premier of Ontario he, like all stubborn Scotchmen—laughter—advanced a theory that something should be done to improve the highways. His theory has been a stimulus for the promoting of the work. Some of his colleagues thought that he should have left it alone, because of the friction that might be created between the larger and smaller municipalities as to which should get the most money. The object of Senator Ross' measure was rather to stimulate local effort."

Later his Honor said: "Every mile of good roads constructed by a municipality is an object lesson to the other municipalities to do the same thing and thus give the people ideal highways."

In the course of a brief address on "What Country Roads Have Accomplished," Mr. A. W. Campbell, Deputy Minister of Public Works, said that the improvements in roads, bridges and culverts had been something marvelous.

"Whereas, the Province has, with a lavish hand, aided our privately owned railways which provide the long haul to market for our farm products;

"Resolved, that the Province now provide more liberal aid for the equally important short haul of the same products from the farm to the railway station over our publicly owned highways by increasing the present grant from one-third to one-half the cost for good roads."

This resolution was moved by Mr. J. F. Beam, of Welland, at the session of the Ontario Good Roads Association this morning at the close of his address on "The True Solution of the Good Roads Problem." The resolution was carried.

Papers were also read by Rev. G. L. Telfer, Paris; Messrs. G. W. Bennett, Peterboro; W. D. Annis, Scarborough; J. D. Evans, Islington; Jas. A. Bell, county engineer of Elgin; Charles Talbot, county engineer of Middlesex; Frank Barker, county engineer of York; C. L. Hicks, Humber; R. H. Jupp, Simcoe; J. W. Gage, warden of Wentworth County; R. E. Taylor, Picton; A. McE. Rankin, Collin's Bay; Mr. W. H. Pugsley, president of the association, was in the chair.

## STATUES MUTILATED

Royalist Students Hold Demonstrations in Paris.

Paris, March 3.—A number of statues in the garden of the Luxembourg were mutilated last night by a band of royalist students, and at the same time they were covered with such inscriptions as "Down with the Republic," and "Long live the King." Royalist demonstrations have been active of late, and last night an attempt was made also to pull down the statue of Emil Zola at Versailles. This, however, was not successful.
