HEALTH OFFICER

In a province, state or community where modern Public Health legislation has never obtained, the introduction of such, is generally confronted with considerable opposition. This opposition primarily arises owing to the want of knowledge, first as to the needs and secondly the aims and procedure of the legislation and its modern service efficiently carried out, requires the expenditure of money, a mere nominal sum to the individual, but collectively for an entire County, to some apparently a large amount, and when viewing this total they are impressed with the fact that their taxes must necessarily be greatly increased.

Again, the fundamental principle of Public Health is correcting the series of omission and commission along health lines among our people, in order that the "ounce of prevention" with its multitudinous blessings might prevail.

Our friends many times are pleased to regard such legislation as interfering with their rights and freedom; but in this particular after having become familiar with the benefits, physical, mental and financial, to be derived, there remains but little difficulty in the carrying on of this most important humanitarian service.

In this connection, if we could aim at having every citizen, as he becomes aware of the advantages attending the proper prosecution of Public Health laws, apply the principles of the Golden Rule in his relations to his fellowman and his surroundings, in great measure our problem in this field of service will have been solved.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

The following is a synopsis of historical events of the Miramichi as compiled by the staff of this column aided by one of the teachers.

Jacques Cartier was the first white man to enter Miramichi Bay (1534). He sailed up as far as Neguac Island naming the bay Saint Lunaire. The Indians whom they met with were not unfriendly Cartier tells us in his record of the voyage. He found low sandy banks along the north side of the outer bay extending to Bay Chal-eur.

The next man who entered the bay was Richard Denys who brought with him many Acadians. These people founded a colony under the leadership of Pierre Beau-bair, on an island at the juncture of the two main branches of the river. Beau-bair built a fort with a battery of sixteen guns at French Fort Cove, to protect his village. For some time the place was very prosperous and the colony flourished; a bad harvest however in 1757, reduced the village to a state of starvation and pestilence. The sickness swept away eight hundred of the inhabitants among whom was Beau-bair himself.

Soon after this, British enterprise found its way to the Miramichi. William Davidson, in spite of the warning issued by the Micmacs that he would not live to accomplish what he intended; determined to bring out a band of settlers which he did in 1778.

The bodies of many of the old pioneers are interred at Wilson's Point. The cemetery at Wilson's Point is well worth a visit.
