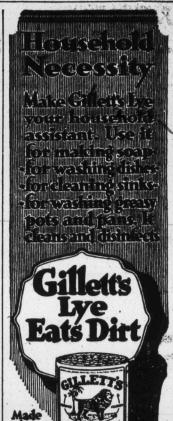
C. N. R. DEFICIT SIXTY MILLIONS

Ottawa,-March 27 Canadian National Railways closed the year with an operating surplus of four million dollars, but with a deficit when fixed and other charges are taken into account, of sixty millions. Such was the announcement of Hon. G. P. Graham, acting Minister of Railways, in making the annual statement on the roads to the House of Commons this afternoon and evening. Although the Grand Trunk has since been formally amalgamated with the Canadian National, Mr. Graham gave statements for the wo systems separately, statements which showed that an operating deficit on the Canadian National was turned into an operating surplus by the Grand Trunk.

The Grand Trunk had an operating surplus of \$13,929,867; the Canadian National system-i, e., the Canadian Northern, the I. C. R., and the G. T. P .- an operating deficit of \$9,736,318. Taking one from the other, the National roads as a whole had an operating surplus for 1922 of \$4,193,549. Compared with the year previous, both systems showed considerable improvement.

This is being accomplished by omiting the former call at Manila which occupied four additional days in the passage between Shanghai and Hong Kong. The Empress steamships will now take only two days by direct sailing from Shanghai to Hong Kong. where formerly six days were required between the two Chinese ports, when the Manila call was included.

The new sailing schedule permits of arrival of the Empress steamships at Hong Kong on the 16th day after departure from Vancouver, whereas up till now 20 days have been reuired. This makes possible a thr ough service from London, England ria Canadian Pacific Atlantic Empresses to Quebec, and rail to Van ouver under 28 days. Residents of London and Hong Kong are thus enabled to save one week's time on the round trip, which is a valuable onsideration to a resident in the Orient, either travelling on furlough or for business reasons.

Campbellton, March 26—Paint which she applied to her face, in "making up" for a fancy dress carnival here ten days ago is believed to have been a contributory cause of the death today of Mrs. Thomas Matheson, prominent in social and church circles. Shortly after the carnival at which she won first prize, Mrs. Matheson's face became affected but her con dition was not considered serious until last Friday, when a physician who was called in for the first time found that she was suffering from blood poisoning. The next day pneumonia developed and her condition became steadily worse.

Mrs Matheson took a preminent part in charitable and religious work, and her death was a severe shock to the townspeople. - She is survived by her husband and two children, one aged 14 and the other two years old.

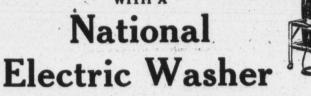

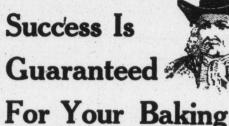
