SPLENDID RECORD MADE BY RED CROSS SCHEME

HAMILTON FRUIT KITCHEN IDEA EXTENDED TO OTHER CEN-TRS INCLUDING ST. CATHARINES PROVED A FINE SUCCESS DURING THE WAR.

The following extract from the Red Cross report will give our readers an idea of the splendid work done by the Hamilton Fruit Kitchen which is affiliated with this district:-

The campaign of 191v was carjed on by the Canadian Club as the Red Cross Fruit Campagn for Over seas hospitals, in which St Catharines, Niagara Falls and Burlington foined Hamilton, with a total production of 47,000 quart jars, representing 117,500 pounds valued at \$35,250. It was in y916 that the Red Cross Society established the Fruit Department. There was produced that year with the assistance of St. Catharines, 53,000 quart jars, equal to 132,-500 pounds, and valued at \$40,750.

In 1917 ther was produced 160,000 quart jars, equal to 400,000 pounds, and valued at \$120,000. In 1918 the scope of the worb was enlarged, tabing in the Women's Institute Canning Centres at Parkhill, Stratford.
