The Turnover in Ottawa

The scarcely credited rumor of the change in Liberal candidates in Ottawa has turned out to be well founded.

The new move is a remarkable confession of weakness. An official statement that the Conservative would carry both Ottawa seats.

But regarded from a national standpoint the low development has a serious bearing. It will be recalled that on the occasion of the last bye-election for the Dominion, Sir Wilfrid Laurier personally interceded to prevent the candidacy of a prominent young Liberal because he regarded some of his transactions in connection with one of the departments as not being exactly creditable.

When the local Liberal association had occasion to nominate candidates for the general elections in August the sitting member was set aside and Mr Fraser supplanted him as the nominee of the Liberal convention.

Mr Fraser's name had figured prominently in connection with certain timber limit deals during the past session of parliament which the opposition had alleged were most discreditable, and the government had defended as being clean and above board.

Ever since Mr. Fraser's nomination by the local Liberal association it had been understood that Sir Wilfrid Laurier looked upon him with disfavor as a candidate, in the same way that he had regarded the other proposed candidate in the by-election, and it was freely predicted that he would interfere to prevent Mr Fraser going to the polls.

In his public speeches he has denied that the administration of the department has been inept or corrupt, and he has denounced the criticisms of the opposition as the emanations of "rakers." Before a large audience throughout the country he has waved aside the charges of the opposition with scorn so professed that he would not even attempt to answer them.

Where Does the Money go? The question of great importance in the Province of Ontario shortly before the Ross government was turned out of office was "Where did the money come from?"

The people answered the question for themselves. Mr Stratton retired from public life. Mr Ross after a short term as leader of the opposition, found refuge in the Senate.

The alarming increase in the public debt, and the undepicted fact that Mr Fielding's gross estimates for 1908-9 amount to \$188,000,000, notwithstanding that Canada's revenue is just now falling at the rate of \$20,000,000 per annum, suggests another question of far greater and more general importance, "Where does the money go?"

In 1896 Sir Wilfrid Laurier used these words "I promise you that if you put our party into power we will reduce the annual expenditure by two or three million dollars per annum"; and Sir Richard Cartwright was wont to say that it was a disgrace and a shame to the Conservative government that they should ask for an expenditure of \$38,000,000 a year for Federal purposes.

It is fair to take the Department of Marine and Fisheries as an example of all other departments because that Department has lately received special attention from Moore, Courtney, Fyvie, and Bazin in their report on the Civil Service. It should never be forgotten that these gentlemen are all strong Liberals.

George T. Merwin had previous to 1908 been willing to apply to the Marine Department, and apparently enjoyed all the patronage that was sent out in the class of supplies sold by him.

It pledged itself to preserve our public credit and husband our resources. It has given away millions of acres of fertile lands, thousands of square miles of valuable timber lands, miles of valuable coal deposits and mineral lands for nothing or at merely nominal prices to political friends and parasites, and seriously reduced our capital.

It pledged itself to reform in the Civil Service, and witness the Department of the Minister of the Interior, the Minister of Fisheries, and the report of the Civil Service Commission.

It pledged itself to purity in elections and in the conduct of the government, and witness the appointments of Jackson, of Leach, of Preston, and men of like principle to lucrative and honorable positions in the Federal employ.

Never had there been such a government which has so woefully failed to keep faith with the people in the carrying out of its election pledges.

Never has there been a government which has departed so far from the principles advocated by it when it first entered office.

Never in the history of this country has there been a government which comes so openly and daringly before the people to ask to be retained in office simply because they want the offices.

The practical question to be determined on election day is this: Is it safe to entrust the affairs of this country for four years more to men who have thus failed to carry out the solemn pledges on which they obtained power?

What assurance can you have as to what they will or will not do if you again entrust them with power.
