STALLION SOLD.—Mr James Tabb, of the 4th con. has sold his fine young stallion "Wonderful Lad" to Dr W. F. Clark V. S., of South Bend, Indiana, for the round sum of \$250. He was sired by the celebrated imported Clydesdale stallion Collin (No 2036) page (512) vol. 5th. Clydesdale Stud Book of Scotland. Wonderful Lad is registered in the Dominion Draft Stud Book of Canada. His dam is also registered in the same book, he is one year and nine months old and weighs 1475 lbs. He took first prize at the Great North Western Exhibition in Goderich last fall, in a large class of competitors, and was pronounced by experts to be the finest specimen of horse flesh at the exhibition. His pedigree is second to none in Canada.

The court of revision for the township of Colborne met in the township hall, Carleton, on Saturday, May 26th. The members having signed the oath required, the following appeals against the assessment were laid before the court: Wm Altin, for over assessment as compared with other farm lands in the township, and after some consideration, A Molloy moved, sec. by N. John, that his assessment be reduced \$2 per acre. Chas McHardy appealed on the same grounds. The board adjourned for an hour for dinner. On resuming business Mr McHardy's was taken up and dealt with for a length of time. J. Taylor moved, seconded by A Molloy, that the said assessment be reduced \$3 per acre. Carried. Thus Morris also appealed as the former persons, and after examining his assessment, A Molloy moved, sec. by N. John, that his assessment be reduced \$1 per acre. Carried. John Horton's appeal on the same grounds as the above was dealt with. J. Taylor moved, sec. by A Young, that the said assessment be reduced \$2 per acre. Carried. Edward Shaw also appealed on the same grounds, but no action was taken. James Tobin appealed on the same grounds as the former, and after examining and comparing his assessment, J. Taylor moved, sec. by A Young, that said appeal be reduced \$1 per acre. Carried. John Clutton also appealed on the same grounds, but no action was taken. Wm Clutton also appealed on the same grounds, and after carefully comparing his appeal, J. Taylor moved, sec. by A Young, that his assessment be reduced \$1 per acre. Carried. Ellen Horton also appealed, but no notice was taken. John Keane also appealed on the same grounds as the rest, and on a motion made by N. John, sec. by A Young, that Mr Atwell's assessment be reduced \$37 per acre. Carried.

The court then formed a council for the despatch of regular business. The reeve in the chair and members all present. The minutes of last meeting read, and after making alterations was approved. The following accounts were passed: R. Kerr, repairing road, \$4; J. McLarty, repairing road on 4th con., \$1.75. Owen Jones was granted the request of doing his roadwork for the corner lot, "on division line and 5th con.", on the division line between said corner and Carleton. A Molloy moved, sec. by J. Taylor, that Bylaw No. 36 for 1875, referring to statute labor be repealed, and that the following be substituted therefor, that any person not otherwise assessed, shall be liable to 2 days work. If assessed at \$500 or under \$1600, be liable to 3 days work; \$1600 or under \$2400, be liable to 4 days work; \$2400 or under \$3400, liable to 5 days work; \$3400 or under \$4400, liable to 6 days work; \$4400 or under \$5400, liable to 7 days work; and for every additional \$1000 or fraction thereof, one day more. Carried. The council then adjourned to meet again on Saturday, July 7th, at 2 o'clock.

Bradley, any R. McCall, to have their fences removed off road allowance by Oct 1st. next, Jas Robinson to have water course opened through his property, J. Stevenson, pathmaster, to have 6th St. opened from Russell St. south two chains. Accounts paid: Kinlop Agricultural Society \$25; T. Green, \$2 for under-drain; J. O'Connor, repairing culvert L. R. \$2.50; D. Mathison, repairing culvert at Kintail, \$1; A. Mogach, repairing L. R. \$2; R. Cameron, repairing culvert on boundary, \$4.50; W. Shackleton, underdrains, \$4.50; H. Johnston, repairing culvert, \$1.50; K. Hunter, repairing culvert, \$4.50; A. Spruel, book case, \$16; J. Bryan, printing, \$17.75. The council then sat as a Court of Revision. After considering the roll, J. McKenzie moved, sec. by H. Chambers, that the assessment roll be accepted as revised this 28th day of May 1888. Council met again July 14th.
