

Two Children Rescued From Drowning.

Mr. Thomas Wheeler, of Summerside, rescued two little children from drowning a few days ago. He was passing along towards his home to dinner when his attention was arrested by the screams of two little children belonging to Mrs. Kelly, who had fallen into the water. Mr. Wheeler hastened to their rescue and was just in time to rescue them as they were going down for the last time.

The children, a boy 7 years and a girl aged 10 years, were wading on a plank from the shore when the boy fell off the outer end. The girl went to the rescue of her little brother and they both got into each other's grasp and would have drowned but for the timely appearance of Mr. Wheeler. Strange to say another man was on the beach at the time, in fact ahead of Mr. Wheeler, but declined to go beyond the depth of his knees in the water, and even told Mr. Wheeler not to go or he may be drowned.

The little boy was unconscious when taken on shore, and it was some time before the little ones fully recovered from the effects of the experience.—Western Star.

Received a Fright.

Last night a woman named Fitzgerald came to the lock up enquiring for her son whom she had not seen for the day. The poor woman had been told that her son had been drowned in Quidi Vidi Lake while swimming there. She rushed to the station in great alarm but was very pleased when she found that he had been locked up for drunkenness. Typhoid Fever.

There are now five cases of typhoid fever at Northern Light. Dr. Chisholm who has been sent there from Manuels to look after the requirements reports that two are very ill and may not survive. The houses in which the patients are—4 altogether—have been quarantined.

Smallpox Case.

There is another case of smallpox at St. Lawrence from the schooner M. Parkes which arrived there from Sydney last Wednesday with a load of coal to Messrs. Hann & Co. This is the second case to develop on board. Dr. Smith had the schooner put on quarantine.

Wireless From the Labrador.

A Marconigram was received by Mr. Jerrett, of Brigus, yesterday from his agent at Indian Harbor saying that a great improvement in the fishery had taken place there since the 27th of July when the Solway came along going south. The fish is now beginning to run out of the bays and filling the traps twice a day.

At Cowan's Farm.

Fire Destroys Two Barns and Contents.

Master Jack Cowan, fooling with matches, set fire to the hay in his father's barn, Topsail Road, yesterday afternoon, and in twenty minutes two barns, five tons of hay, eight dozen fowl and a pig were reduced to cinders. Jack himself had a narrow escape and would have been burned to death but for the prompt action of one of his father's servants, who on seeing the blaze ran to the barn and turned Jack out. The fire, fanned by the wind, quickly spread to the adjacent barn and to Mr. Peter Cowan's residence. The prompt action of the people who assembled and got buckets of water saved the dwelling after hard work. The members of the Cycling Club ran to the spot and rendered yeoman service. Head Constable Peet and four policemen also came on the scene, and with the assistance of the Nash's and other neighbors they removed all the house furniture from the dwelling. The loss is a heavy one to Mr. Cowan, who is one of our most industrious farmers.

Died at Salmonier.

Again death has visited us, and this time claimed as his victim a very old and respected resident of Newbridge, Alice McDonnell, wife of the late Thomas McDonnell. Deceased was 65 years of age and was well known throughout the whole settlement. In every dwelling where sickness and death were present she was ever ready in her own way to offer her assistance and sympathy to those who needed them. Patient and uncomplaining during her trials in life, she was also so during her illness, until July 29th when she passed peacefully away surrounded by a large circle of friends and relatives and fortified by the rites of Holy Church. Before her marriage, forty years previously, she resided at La Manche with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Melvin. Deceased leaves to mourn her six daughters, three sons, one sister and seven brothers. Two of her daughters are residing at Halifax, one at St. John's, one at St. Mary's, and her eldest son at Boston. Much sympathy was felt for the youngest son, who returned from fishing only in time to attend her funeral. Indeed the grief of her children who were present when interment took place was heart touching, and only those who have suffered the loss of a parent can understand their grief.

Arrested for Larceny.

Yesterday afternoon the police arrested a man named Bennett for larceny. It seems he went into Ayre & Sons' store and watching his opportunity stole a can of paint and 4 lbs. of tobacco, the property of a man who had just purchased the goods and left them on the counter while he went out to make some purchases elsewhere. One of the young ladies in the store saw Bennett take the goods and imagined it was his property, as she had not seen the other man buy it. The police were apprised and were not long before they had the man under lock and key. They found the goods in his possession.

Drunkness Regatta Day.

There was more drunkenness on the race course this year, especially in the evening, than for several years past. This was caused by men bringing flasks and bottles from the city to the course, and partaking of their contents in the hot weather they were quickly under the influence. If a license for malt liquor had been given many a man who went home drunk or who fetched up in the lock up would have been sober and avoided trouble. There was a big crowd in the lock up Wednesday evening and also last night, every cell being filled.

Forest Fires are Still Burning.

By the Prospero last night we learn that the rain of Saturday did not completely quench the fire which raged around Catalina. There is a good deal of the woods still smouldering, and if a high wind again blows there will be a big fire down there.

Robertson took a splendid shot and landed the sphere in the twine, notching up No. 2 for the Highlanders.
