Fired Curtains.

At 11.30 a.m. yesterday Master Jack Campbell, son of Mr. W. Campbell, butcher, of Water Street, in leaving his house lit a match in the hallway and threw it carelessly one side, passing out quickly and closing the street door behind him. People passing up the street a few moments later saw the curtains at the plate glass panels of the door blazing, and ringing the bell brought Mrs. Campbell and the servant to the scene. When they got down stairs the curtains had been consumed and the woodwork near was on fire but was quickly quenched by men who ran in off the street. Master Campbell threw the match without observing it up against the curtains and fired them.

Logging Booming.

By the schr. Minnie J. Hickman which arrived here laden with lumber from Dog Bay, Saturday, we learn that at that place (Dog Bay), Campbells, Botwood, Red Indian Lake and other centres larger gangs of men than usual have gone in the forests logging. This is earlier than for many years past, and if the weather serves during the winter the biggest cut of wood on record will be made in Newfoundland. Most people, especially young men who have done well at the fishery do not take kindly to the arduous life of the woodsman, so that to get them to engage in it prices of labour have advanced from \$20 per month to \$22 and up to \$25. The men get their board with this so that they have good money coming to them by the end of the season.

LONDON, Oct. 27.

Turkish troops were the first to take the offensive in a desperate battle which ended in the fall of the town of Kumanovo into the hands of the Serbian troops, and opened up the way for their further advance on the stronghold of Uskub. During drizzling rain and heavy fog, the Turkish troops advanced on the Serbian position, five miles from Kumanovo. Heavy fighting lasted throughout the afternoon, and both armies suffered severe losses; but the Serbians succeeded in staying the Turkish onslaught. The battle was resumed at 1 a.m. on Thursday, the Serbians taking the offensive, and attacking the Turkish troops during the lull in fighting. After an artillery duel a general advance was ordered by the Serbian commander, at 6 o'clock, under the cover of artillery, to which the Turkish field guns vigorously replied. The ground over which the Serbian troops had advanced was open, and the infantry was exposed to a sweeping fire. They stormed the Turkish trenches again and again, until finally, at the point of the bayonet, they drove the Ottoman troops out. It took the Serbians four hours to clear the valley, but it was found necessary before occupying Kumanovo, to take the heights on the right bank of the river to which the Turkish troops had retreated in disorder. At one period of the fighting, the Serbian artillery annihilated three squadrons of Turkish cavalry. The Turkish losses are said to number 5,000 killed and wounded, while 12 of their field guns were captured. The Serbian casualties were also heavy. They lost many officers, including two regimental and several battalion commanders. At the town of Novi Bazar, further to the north, there was a brisk battle. After the town was taken by the Serbians, the Turks attempted to retake it, but were repulsed and virtually annihilated.

When the Serbians were within fifteen paces, the Turks opened fire, whereupon the Serbians charged and killed them all at the point of the bayonet.

PARIS, Oct. 27.

The Matin says that news has been received from Constantinople, through an indirect, but reliable source, that on Friday morning Bulgarians routed the Turkish forces massed at Kavaldi. According to the Turkish Headquarters staff, the affair cost the Turks 1,300 men killed. (As Kavaldi is just north of the Bulgarian boundary line, it would appear that the Turkish troops, despite the capture of Mustapha Pasha and Kirk Killiseh, and the siege of Adrianople, had succeeded in pushing their way into Bulgarian territory.)

BELGRADE, Oct. 27.

It is officially announced to-night that the spoils captured at Kumanovo included 55 field guns, 6 mounted guns, 6 Maxims, quantities of stores and ammunition and two Europeans. At Sienitzka the Serbians captured 13 big guns and 4 Maxims. Forty thousand Turks were engaged fighting in this district. They are accused of massacring many women and children before they were defeated. Most of the prominent Slav inhabitants were imprisoned, but were rescued by the Serbian soldiery. A body of 5,000 Armenians and Turks raised white caps on their bayonets as a sign of surrender, and the Serbian commander gave orders to cease firing.

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PARIS, Oct. 27.
