LONDON, Oct. 27.

Turkish troops were the first to take the offensive in a desperate battle which ended in the fall of the town of Kumanovo into the hands of the Servian troops, and opened up the way for their further advance on the stronghold of Uskub. Heavy vanish in five minutes. fighting lasted throughout the afteroon, and both armies suffered severe losses: but the Servians succeeded n staying the Turkish onslaught. The battle was resumed at 1 a.m. on Thursday, the Servians taking the offensive, and attacking the Turkish troops during the lull in fighting. After an artillery duel a general advance was ordered by the Servians commander, at 6 o'clock, under the cover of artillery, to which the Turkish field guns vigorously replied The ground over which the Servian troops had advanced was open, and the infantry was exposed to a sweep ing fire. They stormed the Turkis trenches again and again, until finally, at the point of the bayonet, they drove the Ottoman troops out. It took the Servians four hours to clear the valley but it was found necessary before occupying Kumanovo, to take the heights on th right bank of the river to which the Turkish troops had retreated in disorder. At one piriod of the fighting, the Servians' artillery annihilated three squadrons of Turkish cavalry. The Turkish losses are said to number 5,000 killed and wounded, while 12 of their field guns were captured. The Servian casualies were also heavy. They lost many officers, including two regimental
