Opera Co. Plans.



MME. MARIA DE GABBI,
Prima Donna Soprano, Boston Opera Company.

Mme. Maria De Gabbi is one of the prima donna sopranos of the Boston Opera Company who will be heard at the Casino during the Grand Operatic Festival to be given under the direction of Edwin Bower Hesser, on September eighth, ninth and tenth. Mme. De Gabbi was one of the stars in the tour of the Maritime Provinces last year, when she sang the roles of Marguerite in "Faust" and that of Maddalena de Coligny in "Andrea Chénier." The leading roles in both of these operas being taken by Mr. Giovanni Gatti, primo tenore, who in private life is her husband. These artists first became associated in Italy, and their engagement to be married was announced at a joint honor night given to them at that most famous of opera houses, the Teatro del la Scala in Milan. They were chosen by the great composer Puccini to originate for Italy the principal roles in his great work "The Girl of the Golden West."

If the plans for bringing the Festival to St. John's are completed, these stars will be heard in the principal roles of "I Pagliacci," at least, and in other operas if the public so indicate their desire. Director Hesser, who is at Waterford Hall, would be pleased to receive suggestions as to the most suitable operas for presentation, or any such suggestion can be made to Mr. Power, at the Atlantic Book Store, where a subscription list will shortly be opened.

The operas, complete, which it would be possible to produce are "Cavalleria Rusticana," "I Pagliacci," "Il Segreto Matrimonio," "Secret of Suzanne," or condensed versions of "Faust," "Barber of Seville" and "Martha." These are all presented with scenery and elaborate costuming. The question as to the three most desired here will be settled before Mr. Hesser sails next Saturday on the S. S. Florizel.

MRS. HENNEBURY.

Another landmark has gone to the Great Beyond, in the person of Mrs. Dinah Hennebury, who passed peacefully away yesterday morning, after a brief illness, at the old homestead in Quidi Vidi. Deceased reached the advanced age of eighty-four years and is one of the last of the good old stock. Her husband predeceased her. Mrs. Hennebury was a splendid type of woman and well liked by every one who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. Self Confessed King of Thieves

Whose Pupils, he Declares, Stole \$5,000,000 a Year, Starts Uphaval in New York's Underworld.

New York, July 4.—Five million dollars a year, perhaps a little more, so the New York Merchants' Association declares, is the cash value of the loot that has been passing directly or indirectly through the hands of Isadore Rader and his now famous "larceny trust," which has been operating peacefully for at least ten years on the East Side.

This modern Fagan, now in the Tombs, has been the sole professor in a formidable school of vice, teaching the fine art of stealing on a big scale, aided and abetted by certain first-rank detectives, according to corroborative testimony furnished the district attorney following Rader's astounding testimony.

Working in conjunction with these "school" truck thieves and pick-pockets, Rader confesses, big jobbers, auctioneers, trusted dock watchmen, shipping clerks and many women were a part of this gigantic trust which Rader conducted ostensibly as a respectable business man from his pool and billiard hall on the East Side.

In appearance Isadore Rader is a real Dickens character. He looks just as if he stepped out of a first edition of "Oliver Twist."

His power has rested chiefly in his ability to avoid arrest and conviction, not only of himself but of his confederates, who, like magic, at the will of their chief, have been removed from prison, often without trial and always without sentence.

His pupils followed his bidding with fear and trembling. His authority has been undisputed. All things examined by the district attorney since his confessions declare that it was absolutely necessary for any "fence" wishing to do business to "see" Rader, before they could hope for protection.

The chief aids to Rader's "scholar" were receiving clerks on the docks and trusted watchmen, who got their "piece" slipped to them in a match box, when they asked for a light, or by other ingenious ways, before turning deaf ears and blind eyes to the truck thieves' operations, which often amounted to \$10,000 in a single haul.
