## Large Versus Small Family.

Yes, yesterday I printed in this column the first installment of one of the finest human documents I have ever read. It is a letter describing the home life of the kind of family America needs more than it needs anything else. Its author is the mother of eight children. Not finding it enough to do to take care of this family without outside help of any kind she adopted a ninth. She is still so young looking that she is often taken for one of her children. She tells simply but graphically how she has accomplished this miracle.

"I graduated from the S. F. G. H. S. with the class of '90 and married a few months later. I have used my education to raise my family. Thanks to my good husband, who is still my lover, I have kept up my music, and singing, and passed it along. We have six girls and three boys. My hubby and I and four big daughters belong to an Ontario Society. The two elder girls play the violin very well. One daughter is a fine pianist, and all the rest sing. We have very little 'cash,' but own our own happy home and try to live naturally, without any false airs! The girls now have their sweethearts, and when they all call at the same time, we have a very merry crowd. I wish you could know us. We have raised our family on love and have studied our youngsters, realizing that no two are alike.

We have tried to make our youngsters ambitious for themselves. We told them when they were small that they would have to work for the education that we would give them a Grammar School education, and what they got afterwards they must work for. One daughter is a milliner, the second worked, and put herself through a shorthand school and is now a public stenographer. The third is a book-keeper, the fourth is working as a cashier this vacation, and still going to high school intending to be a teacher. We have had ten children, two have died. Eight are living, and the ninth is a dear little four-year-old, whom we have adopted. She was one of those little nameless waifs taken about a year and a half ago from a 'Home' in San Mao, where twenty-six little ones were being treated

cruelly. Our 'Mother's Club' went to sew for them, and Baby nestled up to me and I fell in love with her. I told the family about her and they all wanted her, so we sent for her and now have adopted her for our very own. We have had her a year, and it seems as if she has always been ours. The name they gave her was 'Lithel Barrymore.' For she is such a little mite and dancer. We have kept that name with our own for possible identification some day. I must stop taking your time, but when I get started about my family, I can't. Please stand up for the big family, for there is no happiness so complete, if one will only look at it that way, and think of the happiness still to come, when all the little grand children come along."

## Household Notes

Thinly sliced bananas moistened with mayonnaise and placed between buttered slices of bread make excellent school sandwiches.

When garments of any kind are washed in gasoline, add a few drops of oil of cedar. The disagreeable odor will not be noticed.

Salt thrown into the oven immediately after something has been burned in it will make the objectionable odor less noticeable.

To stretch kid gloves when new, place them between the folds of a damp towel for almost one hour before they are to be worn.

Add a pinch of cream of tartar to the whites of eggs when they are half beaten. This keeps them from falling before being used.

The careful laundress always keeps a small vegetable brush at hand for the purpose of brushing out the fringe of collars and towels.

For a much-used ironing board, make two slips of heavy, unbleached cotton cloth and use it alternately to keep the board fresh and clean.

A delicious salad is made of bananas cut in slices, dipped in mayonnaise, rolled in minced nuts and served on white lettuce heart leaves.

An excellent cleaner for painted surfaces is made as follows: Two quarts of hot water, two tablespoonfuls of turpentine, a pint of skimmed milk and enough soap to make a weak suds.

Mashed potatoes, left over, should be packed in a cup or bowl until needed for frying. Another way to use it is to put into a double boiler with some warm milk. It will be quite tasty.

Scorched linen may be wet with soap suds and put in the sun; if the scorch is very brown, try boiling the article in a gallon of milk into which a pound of white soap has been dissolved.
