Home Rule Bill Passed.

LONDON, May 25. The Home Rule Bill for Ireland passed its third and final reading in the Commons to-day. It now becomes law automatically, under the operation of the Parliament Act.

LONDON, May 25. The provisions in the Home Rule Bill which passed the Commons yesterday, are as follows:

A Senate of forty members, and a House of Commons of one hundred and sixty-four members. The Irish Parliament cannot legislate on peace or war, or navy, army or any naval or military force; for foreign relations or trade outside Ireland, except certain defined legislation; coinage or tender. It cannot make any law, either directly or indirectly, to establish or endow any religion; or prohibit free exercise thereof or give preference, privilege or advantage or impose any disability or disadvantage on account of religious belief or religious or ecclesiastical status; or make religious belief or religious ceremony a condition of the validity of marriage.

Temporary restrictions are placed on legislation on land purchases, on age pensions, national insurance, lab or exchanges, the Royal Irish Constabulary, post offices and other savings banks, and friendly societies.

The executive remains invested in the Sovereign or his representatives, forty-two members will be sent from Ireland to the House of Commons; the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council to give final decisions as to constitutional validity of any Act passed by the Irish Parliament.

The Irish Exchequer to defray cost of Irish administration, except for reserved services mentioned above; the Imperial Exchequer to pay an annual sum to the Irish Exchequer, starting at \$2,500,000 a year, and eventually after six years becoming a permanent payment of \$1,000,000 annually.

Twenty Thousand Dollar Picture Sold for Five.

LONDON, May 16.—The trade-union convent of Santa Chiara is awaiting trial here on the charge of stealing valuable pictures presented to the institution by the late Abbess, Sour Immacolata, who was formerly a duchess of an ancient Italian family. The nun, who was the Abbess's attendant, appears to have been under the impression that after the latter's death, the pictures became her property. One of them, which she sold to a Neapolitan dealer for \$5, was later sold in Paris for \$20,000.

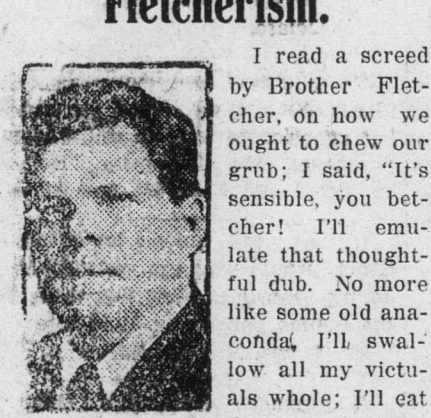

Comets.

A comet is a large and luminous head backed up with nothing but a few million miles of tail. This would make the comet a great natural curiosity if it were alive and lived on earth. But the comet is an astronomical phenomenon and is usually observed only in the headlines of our leading dailies. Everyone knows about comets but few have seen them except the earnest handworking astronomers who spend their nights roaming the illimitable ether with a single-barreled telescope, weighing and registering new-born constellations and announcing the arrival and departure of regularly scheduled celestial bodies in words that have to be taken apart like a fishrod in order to be carried in a suit case.

Comets are distinguished by their impressive appearance when they can be seen by their wandering disposition. The comet travels from solar system to solar system, making a regular territory with all the faithfulness of a grocery salesman. But a comet only visits the trade once in fifty to fifty thousand years. This is its great advantage. By the time it comes back the descendants of its customers have forgotten all complaints. The most celebrated comet working this territory at present is Halley's comet. In 1909 it made its regular visit, and as those who had seen it seventy five years ago had almost all died, its advertising agents were able to work up an immense interest in its arrival. It turned out to be a frayed fraud of irregular habits and no brilliancy, and every one was dissatisfied. But in another seventy-five years it will draw the same old crowd.

No comet has come near enough to the earth to allow the scientist to cut off a sample from its tail, but our most expert authorities say that said tail is of almost inconceivable tenuity, like the plot of a musical comedy, and could be packed in a suitcase like the costumes for the same. A comet's head is sometimes hundreds of thousands of miles in diameter, and this fact often creates great nervousness, as visiting comets travel without dispatchers' orders and do not turn out for anything. However, astronomers assure us that comets' heads are mostly gaseous, intermingled with small solid particles a few hundred miles in diameter. This should be a great comfort to all good doggers.
