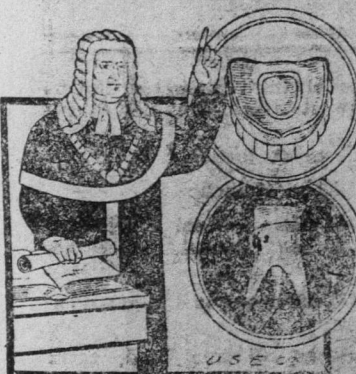

List of Losses of Two
Navies During the War.

Lists of naval losses during the present war show that Britain has lost one super-dreadnought, one battleship, ten cruisers, two submarines, two gunboats and three converted cruisers, a total of nineteen.

Germany has lost nine cruisers, seven destroyers, six submarines and four converted cruisers, a total of twenty-six.

GREAT BRITAIN.

August 6.—Cruiser Amphion, sunk by mine in North Sea, 131 men lost.
September 2.—Armored merchant steamer Eyrion, sunk by mine in North Sea.

September 4.—Gunboat Speedy sunk by mine in North Sea.

September 5.—Light cruiser Pathfinder, sunk by German submarine in North Sea, 259 lives lost.

September 8.—Armored merchant steamer Oceanic wrecked on north coast of Scotland.

September 20.—Cruiser Pegasus damaged by German cruiser Koenigsberg in harbor off Zanzibar.

September 22.—Armored cruisers Aboukir, Cressy and Hogue sunk by German submarine U-9 in North Sea; 1,483 men lost.

October 6.—Armored merchant steamer Ardmore destroyed by British mine in North Sea.

October 15.—Cruiser Hawke sunk by German submarine in North Sea; 350 men lost.

October 18.—British submarine E-3 sunk by mine in North Sea.

October 27.—Super-Dreadnought Audacious reported sunk by German mine off north coast of Ireland.

October 15.—Cruiser Hawke sunk by German submarine off Dover.

November 1.—Armored cruisers Good Hope and Monmouth sunk in engagement with German squadron off Coronel, Chile.

November 8.—Submarine D-5 sunk by mine in North Sea.

November 11.—Torpedo gunboat Niger sunk by German submarine off Deal, England.

November 26.—Battleship Bulwark sunk in Thames off Sheerness. Cause of sinking uncertain. About 738 men lost.

Say German Fleet
is in Atlantic Now.

Buenos Ayres, Nov. 30.—Despatches received from Montevideo insist that there is good reason to believe that the German squadron, which has been operating in the Pacific Ocean, is at present in the South Atlantic. Neither the French nor the British legation has any information to confirm these reports; nevertheless private despatches gave them credence.

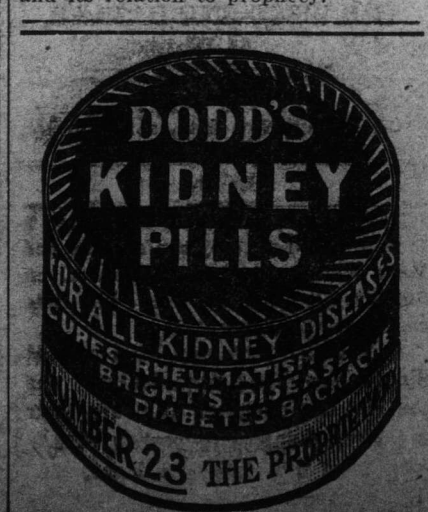
It is related among other things that several German steamers are preparing at Montevideo to provision the warships.

Reports that the German Pacific squadron had succeeded in making its way to the Atlantic have been current for two days. Under date of November 28, Montevideo reported that the German squadron had been sighted 600 miles North of Punta Pilal, Brazil, heading northeast.

Spies in British army

London, Nov. 30.—Two soldiers, a Lance Corporal and a Private in the Hussar regiment of Kitchener's new army, stationed at Oxford, have been proved to be German spies and "dealt with" by the military authorities. Copies of letters relating to the movements and proposed movements of troops were found in their possession.

August 5.—Converted mine layer Koenigin Luise sunk by British destroyer Lance in North Sea.

August 9.—Submarine U-15 sunk by British cruiser Birmingham in North Sea.

August 27.—Converted merchant steamer Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse sunk by British cruiser Highflyer off west coast of Africa.

August 27.—Cruiser Madgeburg blown up by Russian warship after she had gone aground in Gulf of Finland.

August 29.—Cruisers Mainz, Koln and Ariadne and two destroyers sunk by British squadron off Heligoland; 2,500 men lost.

September.—Submarine sunk by British cruiser Pathfinder.

September 14.—Converted merchant steamer Cap Trafalgar sunk by British converted merchantman Carmania off east coast of South America.

September 15.—Cruiser Hela sunk by submarine E-9 in North Sea.

October 17.—Four destroyers sunk by British light cruiser Undaunted and torpedo flotilla off Dutch coast.

November 4.—Armored cruiser York sunk by mine in Jade Bay.

November 8.—Light cruiser Geier interned at Honolulu.

November 9.—Cruiser Emden destroyed by Australian cruiser Sydney at Cocos Island, Indian Ocean.

November 9.—Cruiser Koenigsberg bottled up at Mafia Island, German East Africa.

November 12.—Submarine reported sunk by French torpedo boat off Westende, Belgium.

November 13.—Submarine reported sunk by accident off Dover, and another reported sunk by British cruiser off Belgian coast.

November 17.—Converted cruiser Berlin interned at Trondhjem, Norway.

November 23.—German submarine U-18 rammed and sunk by British patrol ship off west coast of Scotland.

Destroyer S-124 reported sunk in collision with Danish merchant ship Anglo-Dane in North Sea.

Super-Dreadnought
to be Called Canada

AS A MARK OF GRATITUDE.

London, Nov. 30.—The Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill's announcement that one of fifteen new battleships in 1915 will be named 'Canada' is intended in recognition of what Canada is doing to support the Empire.

The fighting strength of this battleship, recently acquired from Chile, and now called the Almirante Latorre, is that of a super-Dreadnought mounting ten 14-inch guns firing shells at the rate of two per minute. These guns are mounted in five turrets.

The vessel has also sixteen 6-inch and four 3-inch quick-firers, beside a number of smaller guns, also four submerged tubes for torpedoes. She displaces 25,000 tons, and has a speed of twenty-three knots.

This is the fifth ship of the British navy bearing the name 'Canada.' The first was launched the same year as Nelson's famous 'Victory'—1765—in honor of the conquest of Canada. Two frigates were launched simultaneously, being named the 'Montreal' and 'Quebec.'

IF JAPAN WOULD FIGHT RUSSIA.

Petrograd, Nov. 28.—The Retch prints an explanation of the mysterious reference by Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, ex-premier of England, at the Guild Hall banquet in London on November 10 to "one of the most important messages ever addressed by one monarch to another." The Retch says that, on the eve of the fall of Tsing-Tau the Kaiser sent a message to the Mikado, in which he proposed to conclude peace with Japan by accepting all the conditions which the Mikado might be pleased to fix. But the German Emperor exacted one condition, namely, that Japan should attack Russia. The Mikado declined to accept the proposal, and added:

"That day when the last foothold of German culture falls in will be one of the most glorious in Japanese history."

The Mikado concluded by telling the Kaiser that he had deceived himself enormously by thinking that Japan, like Prussia, was capable of violating treaties. The Mikado handed the Kaiser's telegram and a copy of his reply to the British minister.

Doctors and Gas Fires

In an article which recently appeared in the London "Evening News," Mr. W. G. Faulkner stated: "In making my inquiries I discovered one significant fact. This was that one company—the Gas Light and Coke Company—had among their consumers 2,500 doctors who had gas fires installed in their houses, some as many as ten or a dozen; that 1,500 of these doctors had become users of gas during the past three years; and that not one had ever given them up."

Professor C. V. Boys, F.R.S., says, in the "Standard": "Sentiment and inertia are the only obstacles against the general adoption of gas fires and cooking appliances. Wonderful strides have been made, in spite of deep-rooted prejudice. A gas fire, burning with a blue, is an admirable agent for heating a room, and, as a scientist, I fail to understand how such a gas fire does the air in a room more than any other fire."—nov17,14

Killing Women
and Children.

Amsterdam, Nov. 30.—The Tjid states that the Chamber of Commerce of Armentieres has sent to the Amsterdam Consul at Dunkirk, with a request that he forward it to Washington, a protest against the bombardment by the Germans of Armentieres. The protest declares that several women and children have been killed, that houses have been set on fire, and that the city is not being used for military purposes by the Allies, not a single soldier being there.

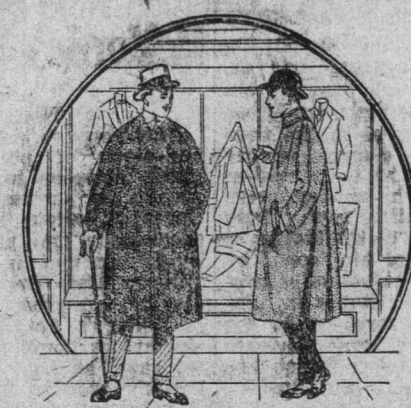
