**SMALL MOTOR BOAT CAUGHT IN STORM.**

Two brothers, John and Thomas Wells, left their homes at Curling on Monday 16th inst., to go to Beverly, a distance of about 24 miles, intending to return again the following day. Latest reports indicate that the men never reached their destination, and no tidings of them have since been heard. A terrific gale of southeast wind was blowing all day on the 16th, and it is feared their small motor boat was swamped and its occupants met a watery grave. The S.S. George I. and a fleet of motor boats have been searching all outlying places between Port au Port and Bonne Bay, but not a trace could they find of the unfortunate men. John Wells was a married man, while Thomas was the sole support of a widowed mother.

**Extending Departmental Building.**

In keeping with its motto of progressiveness, the Royal Stores, Ltd., are about to extend their already extensive premises. It will have a frontage of 50 feet and rearage of 60. The ground floor will be occupied by the Musicians Supply Co., and the Royal Stores crockeryware department. The basement will be used for storage purposes while the two top flats will be used for workrooms. Messrs. Davay Bros. hope to have the building ready for occupancy during October month.

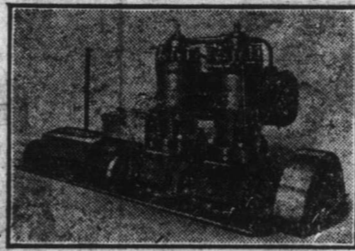
