

# Outport Nursing.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Outport Nursing Committee, (Dr. Campbell, Chairman), being interested in the public will be interested in the report by Lady ... on the work of the Outport Nursing Committee for the last financial year. They also thought that it would be interesting to give a very summary of the latest reports of the Nurses—those for the last year of 1921. It would obviously be impossible for the press to find space for full reports.

Core, R.B.—Visits, 21. Patients 17. The calls cover a range and include 2 mid-wifery and some 30 or more connect accidents or abrasions. The complaints of work being slack in the quarter.

Blanche—74 cases. (1 death Tuberculosis) 48 maternity. There were 11 maternity including 7 of transverse presentation, eclampsia and placenta which were all handled with success by the nurse. In the mentioned case she was able to get the patient for several days.

Bay, (Bay, L'Argent)—10 including 2 maternity. All do well. West Coast—Total number patients 87. Revisits 133. Births 10. The nurse covers a wide area of the shore from Cow Head up to Saunders. The cases include 10 septic wounds, and 16 cases.

Harbour—53 specific cases besides numerous cases of indigestion and other ailments. The cases include 13 cases with which the nurse could not deal satisfactorily.

Island Cove—Total number patients 72. Revisits 80. Deaths 1. A large number of the cases were an epidemic of whooping cough. The nurse points out that most of the cases are due to the lack of nourishment, etc., especially amongst the poor.

Batt's Arm, Fegor—The report from the Chairman of the Medical Committee, who writes: "I am glad to say that we have found her efficient person giving perfect attention everywhere. During the time just closed she has made several visits. There have been cases made to the surgery, and she has attended to 27 maternity cases of which have been highly successful. She is very attentive to the sick patients and very active in diagnosing cases. We now have her almost indispensable and your Committee will be able to find their way to leave Nurse Harvey to the end of her term."

In respect of one of the Nurses Joe Batt's Arm have undertaken the whole expense; and the nurse at Hant's Harbour was to be under special arrangements whereby only part of the expense falls upon the Committee.

At the head of the list for the year is Rose Blanche with \$163. The lowest is Fortune Bay with \$10. The following figures are receipts from the various cases are interesting:—

Blanche, (whole year) \$772.75  
Core, (whole year) 307.99  
Bay, (6 months) 55.89  
Coast, (6 months) 203.27  
The kindness of the Committee in Camp the Outport Nursing was able to send 14 blankets to the nurses for distribution in cases.

## OUTPORT NURSING COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1920-21.

The following is a brief summary of the work of the Outport Nursing Committee for the financial year ending June 30, 1921.

The operations of the Committee began with the appointment of Nurse Butt on July 1, 1920. At that time there were two new nurses from England and two more arrived in April last. Another was engaged in Newfoundland.

## Lemonade and Hot Bath as Influenza Cure.

The nurses' advisory council of New York, organized during the influenza epidemic of 1918, was called together by Health Commissioner Copeland to combat the present outbreak of the disease in New York, which increased 1,032 cases with 20 deaths. The health commissioner made public the following remedy for influenza:

Remain half an hour in water as hot as you can stand it. The water should be kept running so that the heat can be maintained. While in the tub, drink about a quart of lemonade, so hot that you have to sip it slowly. Dry off well and get in bed between blankets. Remain there for an hour. The perspiration will then have ceased. Get up, sponge off with cold water to close the pores and get back to bed, this time between sheets.
