Miners Must Accept Agreement or Forfeit U. M. W. Affiliation

Opening of Nova Scotia Legislature Yesterday--British Prime Minister's Health May Necessitate Rest--Rebel Forces in Mexico in Disorder.

ACCEPT OR FORFEIT AFFILIATION.

SYDNEY, N.S., Feb. 14. The miners of Nova Scotia must endorse the recent Montreal agreement or forfeit their affiliation with the United Mine Workers of America. That in a nutshell is the situation in District 26 to-day, according to those close to the District Executive offices who arrived from Montreal this morning. The referendum will not be held until next week, but when it is held the men are expected to vote "yes" and not "no"; in other words the referendum is merely a matter of form and rejection of the pact will carry with it the stigma of defying the International and the end of the U. M. W. in Nova Scotia. It is the best possible agreement we could obtain and the International representative John L. Lewis, at the Montreal Conference has approved of the pact as a fair one when all things are considered, declared Silby Barrett, Provisional President of the U. M. W., District 26, to the Canadian Press, on his arrival here this morning from Montreal.

CIRCULAR TO MINERS.

SYDNEY, N.S., Feb. 14. The following circular has been sent out to various locals by members of the Executive of the U. M. W.: To officers and members of U.M.W. America, comprising Provisional District No. 26. Greetings: We take this method of notifying all members in Nova Scotia that they must at once return to work and comply with instructions as given by Provisional Officers and International representatives. Instructions: We deem it as hereby quoted: "We instruct men to return to work at once. Contract will later be submitted to referendum vote. We desire to increase membership that no referendum will be submitted for vote until instructions have been complied with by miners returning to work. Trusting membership will comply with instructions at once, we remain, very truly, Silby Barrett, Provisional President, District 26; Robert Baxter, Provisional Field Officer; Andrew Belsie, International Board Member."

PREMIER THREATENED WITH A BREAWDOWN. LONDON, Feb. 14. Stanley Baldwin's sympathetic reference in the House of Commons to the burdens being borne by the Premier was based, according to some parliamentary writers, on the recognition that Ramsay MacDonald is actually in a very poor state of health. They declared he has physical frailties which prescribe limits to his exertions, and he has probably overtaxed his strength, some writers make the prediction that unless the Premier conserves his energy he is likely to suffer a physical breakdown necessitating a long rest.

NOVA SCOTIA'S LEGISLATURE OPENS.

HALIFAX, Feb. 14. Accompanied by all the pomp and pageantry that has descended from the mother of Parliaments, the fourth session of the fourteenth Legislature of Nova Scotia was opened here this afternoon by His Honor MacCullum Grant, Lieut.-Governor of Nova Scotia. The speech from the throne expressed gratification at the industrial progress of the Province during the past year, the success of the fruit harvest, fisheries and increased coal output. It forecast legislation whereby the Government will shoulder part of the cost of school books and dwell upon hydro electric development at East River, Sheet Harbor, and intimate further progress. A substantial financial surplus was promised, while the necessity for exercising the strictest economy in Governmental expenses was emphasized as part of the Government policy note.

PROGRAMME OUTLINED IN THE SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.

HALIFAX, Feb. 14. (By Canadian Press.)—Legislation providing for an eight hour day for coal miners, to regulate the sale of shares, bonds and other securities in joint stock companies, the further protection of the feeble-minded, and to give effect to the resolutions adopted at the recent labour conference at Ottawa, in so far as they are not already covered by existing laws, was forecast in the speech from the Throne read this afternoon at the opening of the fourth session of the fourteenth Parliament of Nova Scotia since Confederation. Additional proposed legislation includes increased annuities for teachers, the partial absorption by the Government of the cost of common school books, and measures looking to the intensive development of various mineral and agricultural resources of the province. The accounts for the year, it was announced, would show a surplus of over \$100,000. The session, which promises to be one of the most interesting in many years, owing to the large number of private bills in prospect, including Church Union and

legislation growing out of the recent audit of civic affairs in Halifax, was opened at three o'clock by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor to the booming of twenty-one guns from the Citadel and the time honoured naval and military display.

REBEL FORCES DISORGANIZED. QUERETARO, Mexico, Feb. 14. Enrique Estrada's rebellious forces are continuing in disorderly retreat after the decisive reverse suffered at Ocellan. While scattered remnants of the Vera Cruz Insurrectionary Army are fleeing northward into the Tuxpan petroleum region and southward in the direction of Oaxaca for the purpose of gaining the Isthmian States, according to declarations of General Serrano, Secretary of War, and General Juan Andrew Almazan, the rebellion must be considered virtually ended.

MEXICAN RAILWAYS. GALVESTON, Texas, Feb. 14. Passenger traffic on the National Railways of Mexico has been ordered stopped, effective yesterday, according to advice received here by Adolfo Jimenez, Rebel Consul. The order was issued by the management, advised with confidence, say:

BUM RUNNER LOST.

BOSTON, Feb. 14. Loss of the British schooner Mary Gardner, while engaged in rum running between Nassau and St. Pierre, was reported at the British Consulate here to-day by Harold Malcolm, of Halifax, one of her crew. He said the vessel capsized in a storm.

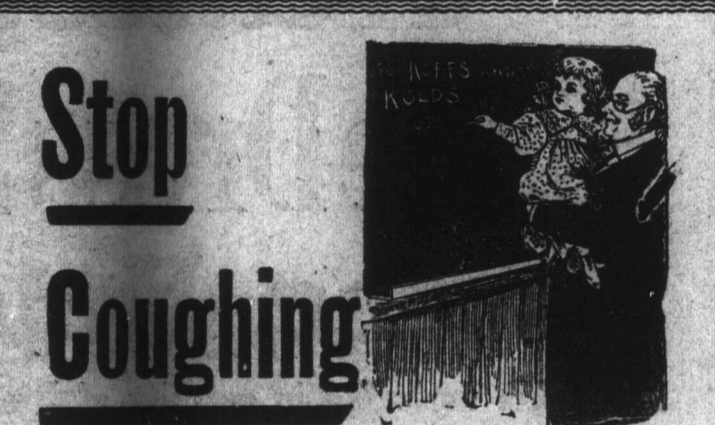
