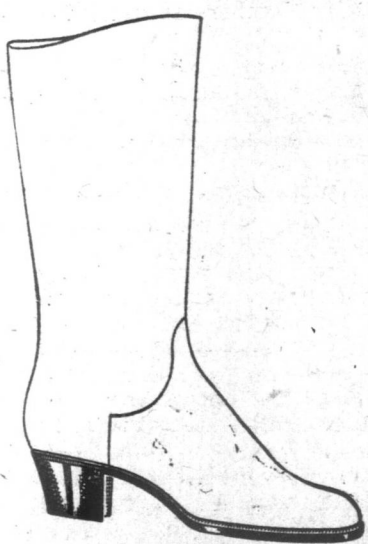

Installation of R.W.M.
and Office Bearers

OF LODGE HEART'S CONTENT, No.

A large party of Masons from the
District Grand Lodge of Scotland, ac-

ing officer, left the city on Wednes-
day afternoon at 1.30 by motor for

Municipal Council

WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Munici-
pal Council was held Thursday after-
noon. Deputy Mayor Martin presided
and Councillors Outerbridge, Collier,
Ryan and Dowden were present.

After confirmation of Minutes of
last meeting, attention was given the
following:

Communication of the Newfound-
land Motor Association in which they
asked that repairs be made to Falk's
Hill; also referring to the Blind Cor-
ner at Junction of Water Street (near
Hayward's Garage.) The former will
be looked after by the City Engineer,
but as the latter is private property
the Council cannot take action in the
matter, other than to write the owners
and ask their cooperation with a view
to eliminating the danger point.

Mr. T. B. Clift complained of in-
convenience caused the residents of
LeMarchant Road and vicinity by
cattle being allowed to roam at large.
The Impounder has during the past
week given particular attention to
this and several other localities from
which complaints were received, and a
number of animals are at present in
the public pound.

With regard to notification served
on residents of Queen Street to re-
pair or remove the plank sidewalk
fronting their premises, Solicitor
Fenelon, on behalf of one of the prop-
erty owners, stated that as soon as
the necessary authority is received
arrangements will be made to carry out
the wishes of the Council in this re-
spect.

Mr. W. J. Kent applied for permis-
sion to build addition to the rear of
his residence, Gower Street. Permit
will be issued for same, subject to
the approval of the City Engineer.

A discussion took place as regards
the suggested diverting of the street
railway route. It was pointed out
that some of the Company's consult-
ing engineers, following transfer of
the property from the Reid Company,
looked upon such an alteration as an
impossibility owing to the steep
grades which would have to be taken
into consideration. The change in
question was the elimination of Hol-
loway Street and substitution of the
Hill of Chips.

Attention was called to the fact
that the lights at the National Me-
morial, King's Beach, have been out
on several occasions recently. The
Executive of the G.W.Y.A. will be
written regarding same.

With regard to the claims made by
the St. John's Gaslight Company,
Water Street West, and Branscombe's
Estate, Waldegrave Street, for dam-
ages to their respective properties,
the City Engineer informed the Board
that at the time in question all the
City sewers were overcharged, par-
ticularly those on the lower levels. A
copy of his report on the matter is
to be forwarded the City Solicitor for
his opinion as to the position of the
Council.

The application of Robinson & Co.,
for surface drain, Duckworth Street,
was granted and the Engineer's De-
partment instructed accordingly.

The following matters were refer-
red to the Engineering Department:

(1) Placing of a plank platform at
East End Cabstand, for the conveni-
ence of cabmen and taxi drivers.

(2) Repairing of steps in the Lane
West of the Telegram building.

(3) The repairing of retaining wall
and steps at Crimp's property, Long's
Hill.

The City Engineer reported on the
work performed by the Waterworks
and Sewerage Departments for the
week. He stated the following roads
are receiving the attention of the
Roads Department:—Pennywell, Sig-
nal Hill and Cookstown Roads, and
Henry Street; that Quiddi Vidi Road
is being oiled, and that arrangements
have been made with the Electric
Light and Telephone Companies for
removal of the poles to new street
line, LeMarchant Road.

The Medical Officer of Health re-
ported no new cases of infectious dis-
ease in the City during the past
week.

The Sanitary Supervisor submitted
his usual weekly report on work of
his Department.

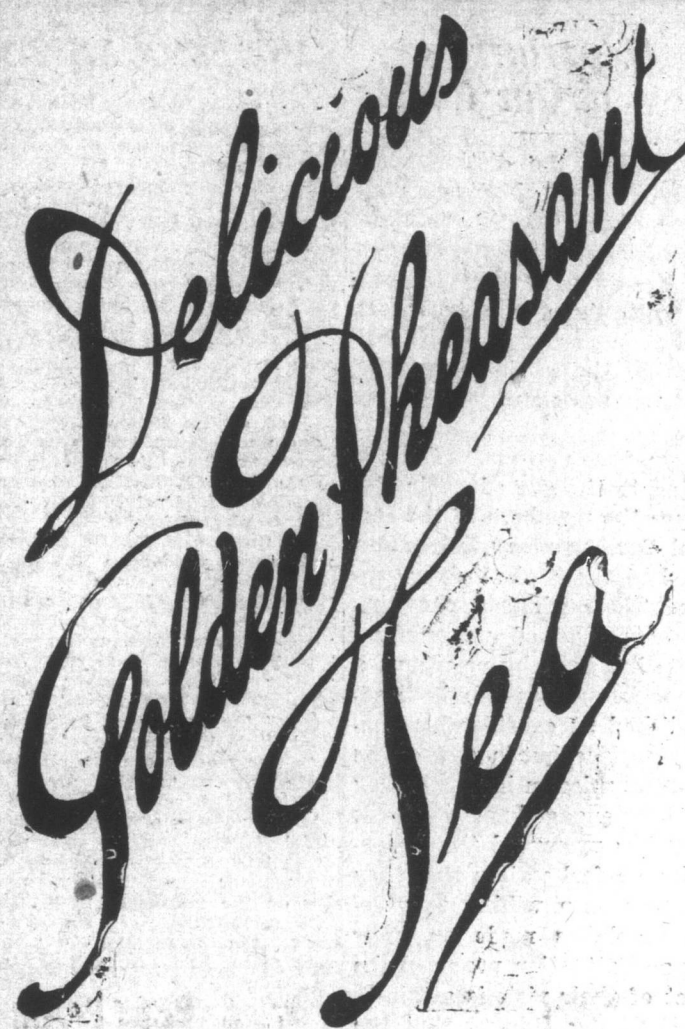
