The new Parliament will doubtless have its full share of patriots who in their anxiety to see the great Canadian Pacific Railroad under way, will not scruple to take a practical part in the work of its construction, and who will deem it but just that their efforts to develop the resources of their country should be well rewarded. For the next ten years the Pacific Railroad Ring of Cenada may be expected to exercise an important influence in the politics of the Dominion, as the many millions of dollars which are to be expended on the new road will offer inducements for jobbery which, according to present indications, will not be neglected.
