"Here's one man who has put his foot down upon that sort of thing. Our parents have died, and we have lost two children, but there has been no crape on my wife, and there won't be. It is a piece of barbarism.

"Social custom is such that if anyone dies a thousand miles away who happens to be a relative you must dress your wife all up in black. As far as I am concerned, there will be no crape in my house. It is one of the things that is crushing the lives

out of men to day. There will be some who will not agree with the Rev. gentleman on this point, but he expresses the views
