—The Ontario Provincial Board of Health favors the establishment of municipal hospitals and sanitariums for consumptives; and does not see any logical reason why municipal and State Government aid should not be given to such. This is a subject deserving the attention of local authorities.

The evening was greatly enjoyed by a very large number of people. Complaints were made, however, on account of the insufficiency of light, a fault that should receive attention next year.

—The Y. M. C. A. Boating Club have ended their season for the year, their leases for boats having run out on the first of the month. The club will not be disbanded, but will hold young men's meetings every Tuesday evening in Victoria Hall. They had leased six boats during the season, and are in a successful condition. They intend organizing chess and checker clubs.

—Said a prominent London Easter yesterday to an ADVERTISER representative: "There is more lumber being unloaded now on the car shops grounds than has been brought here for good many years, and there can no longer be any doubt about the intention of the G. T. R. to locate their shops here permanently if the bonus promised by the city is forthcoming."

—A citizen is bringing suit against an American city to recover damages for a case of typhoid fever alleged to have been caused by the offensive contents of a barn cellar. The attention of the Board of Health had been repeatedly called to the cellar, but the nuisance was not permanently abated. The responsibility of citizens and the duties of health officers should never be forgotten.

—There was quite a commotion on Albert Street, opposite the residence of R. J. Young, between midnight and 1 o'clock this morning. Two buggies driven at a rapid rate collided, resulting in a smashup. The shouting by the respective drivers and their companions awakened the people of the immediate neighborhood. No one seems to have been hurt. A police broken shafts marked the scene of the accident this forenoon.

—The closed mail train, which commencing this week, goes through to Kingston daily from London, reaching there at 12:15 p.m. and leaving at 2:10 p.m. for return, is greatly appreciated in Kincardine, affording them the means of obtaining important communications and daily papers several hours earlier than heretofore. Mayor McPherson, of that town, worked unceasingly until this mail train was secured.

—The number of men at present employed in the G. T. R. locomotive shops in Stratford is 655, the largest number ever employed in the history of these shops. The locomotive power of the road is also, says the Herald, in the best condition now that it has been in for 25 years, and is prepared to cope with the largest demands likely to

—The grape growers of Essex county are smarting under the ruling of the different railroads raising basket fruit from first class to first class and a half, and have sent a resolution to the different railroads showing the injustice of such a ruling, and asking that the old rates be given. The grape owners say that the new ruling would practically shut out all shipping, as they could not compete in the eastern cities with other grape growers further east. London purchasers are interested in this ruling.

—Wm. Underwood and family will remove to London in a couple of weeks. This change has become necessary from a business point of view, the firm for which Mr. Underwood travels requiring that he should reside at headquarters. To say that Mr. Underwood will be missed from the Advertiser does not express the general regret that the news of his departure will create. His genial manners have created a friendship that is shared in by all classes.—[Ingersoll Chronicle.]

—Another splendid run was taken by the London Hunt yesterday afternoon. They took a first-class route, one with several jumps, and beautiful weather made the occasion enjoyable. The ground was slightly too dry to permit of the hounds following the scent as easily as usual. The start was made at Treblebrook's farm, on the Asylum side road, in an easterly direction, then a turn to the north was made, then back by the 3rd concession to the river. The finish was made at the Adelaide street bridge.

Ten years ago the establishment of a daily paper in St. Thomas was an experiment and the young men, E. E. Sheppard and the late W. E. Westlake, both at that time of this city, who put their money and their experience into the enterprise were almost as much prepared for failure as for success. It is not necessary to say that they were agreeably disappointed. From the day of issue the Evening Journal met with public favor, and now, on the tenth anniversary of that day, it is entering a new home, and entering on its second decade, full of hope and courage, under the able management of James E. E. Sheppard, and London's successful printers. The new Journal building is in some respects superior to that of the Globe in Toronto.

Who Enlarged Mr. Radcliffe?
Since Principal Merchant left Stratford Collegiate Institute for London for an increase of salary he has been endeavoring to weaken the Stratford Institute by making bills for some of our teachers. He has been successful, it seems, with S. J. Radcliffe, B.A., who has accepted the English mastership of London for a salary of \$100, the figure accepted being \$1,100. He is expected to leave on the expiration of two months' notice to the Stratford Board. Mr. Radcliffe is an excellent and a rising teacher.—[Stratford Herald.]

W. O. B. Society.
At a meeting of the members of the Western Ontario Bible Society held Friday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. rooms, nearly 50 members attended, including ministers and laymen. Rev. Dr. Sanderson occupying the chair, and Andrew Thompson acting as secretary. The selection of a business manager in place of Dr. Evans, resigned, was the chief item of business, and the choice fell upon Rev. J. H. Orme, Stratford. A sub-committee, consisting of Rev. Mr. Boyd, Rev. J. B. Richardson, Joseph Jeffrey, H. Mathewson and Andrew Thompson, was appointed to make all necessary arrangements in connection with the new officer taking charge.

A Londoner Victimized.
A Chicago telegram of Friday's date says: "President Amy Elder and Vice-President and Secretary H. L. Barber, of the Elder Publishing Company, of this city, are in jail unable to get bonds on the charge of using the mails for fraudulent purposes. An additional charge of having imported an alien under contract was lodged against Elder. It is claimed the concern has swindled hundreds of persons, the company even extend its operations to Canada and Australia. Jared Housel, a farmer lad of 20, from Three Rivers, and Richard H. Jones, the alien in the case, formerly a butcher in London, Ont., made complaint of being the latest victims. Inveigling innocents to sign one-sided contracts to act as 'agents' for the company is said to be the method of the swindle. Between 300 and 600 letters a day from would-be 'agents' generally inclosing money are said to have been received."

Funeral of W. L. Graham.
The funeral of the late W. L. Graham took place Saturday in charge of the Masonic body, of which he was a member, being junior warden of St. George's Lodge. Despite the bad weather the attendance was large, and universal respect is expressed as a result of the untimely death of a man so generally esteemed and beloved. The pall-bearers were the officers of St. George's Lodge, viz.: Messrs. T. H. Lacombe, W. Hayman, A. Ellis, J. A. Nelles, S. Baker and Prof. W. J. Birks. The brothers and brother-in-law of deceased also acted as pall-bearers. Much sympathy is expressed for the wife of deceased, who is a daughter of George Burdette, city. Rev. Mr. Courtice, in Dundas Center Church, will refer to the demise of Mr. Graham, a leading member of his choir, a week from to-morrow.
