Toronto, Feb. 11.-The following is the speech from the throne at the opening of the Ontario Legislature this afternoon:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: I have much pleasure in once more meeting you for the dispatch of the business of the Province, and the legislation which the public interests re-

THE ROYAL BEREAVEMENT. is with feelings of profound sorrow that I refer to the bereavement of her Majesty and the royal family in the death of her Majesty's son-inlaw, Prince Henry of Battenburg. I am sure you agree with me that the whole people of Ontario, in common with her Majesty's loving subjects everywhere, deeply sympathize with her Majesty and H. R. H. Princess Beatrice in their great affliction.

A PATRIOTIC REFERENCE. I am glad to notice that the action of the Government of the United States with respect to the territorial rights of Great Britain in South America, which caused so much anxiety a few months ago, is not likely to lead to a rupture of the peaceful relations which have so long existed between the two nations, and with so much advantage in every way to both. Experiments in fruit growing and orchard spraying have been successfully conducted during the past year and promise good results for the fu-

THE MINING INDUSTRY. The northwestern part of the Prov-ince continues to receive the attentions of prospectors and miners, and gold-bearing ores have been discovered in that region over an area of 2,000 square miles. Several stamp mills have been erected in the districts of the Lake of the Woods, Rainy Lake and Seine River, and the prospect for emgold mining is hopeful. The nickel and copper mines have been fairly productive during the past year, and the completion of a blast furnace at Hamilton will, I trust, lead to the profitable working of our iron mines by providing a local market for their ores.

LUMBER BUSINESS STAGNANT. regret to say that there has been no marked improvement during the past year in the condition of the lumber trade, the prosperity of which exerts so beneficial an influence on the general business of the Province. While the sales, and prices in the English markets have been fairly satisfactory, the market for sawn lumber in the United States has been in a depressed condition, owing to a continuance there of business stagnation and financial disturbance.

Ottawa, Feb. 11.-Sir Charles Tupper arrived yesterday afternoon, but the boom for him seems to be entirely absent. Though the hour of his arnival had been heralded and placarded throughout the city, there was a slim crowd at the station when he came in. Among them, however, were the most of the Ministers of the Crown and officers of the latest Conservative Association formed in the city. The officers of the other Conservative Association, who have held their convention and put their candidates in the field for the general election, were con-spicuous by their absence. An address of welcome was presented to Sir Charles in the city council chamber. Sir Charles looked very feeble, and voice appears to be giving way. He spoke with difficulty. After telling the citizens of Ottawa that he was glad to be once more with them, paying taxes, he delved into his experience in Cape Breton, and told the meeting that his election meant the funeral of the Liberal party. Sir Charles afterwards drove to the residence of his son at New Edinburgh. HOUSE OF COMMONS.

In the House last night Mr. Laurier asked a series of questions as to reasons why the Connollys had not paid their share of the judgment rendered against them in connection with the McGreevy-Connelly scandals. Minister of Justice replied that a steam dredge belonging to the Connollys had ben seized and offered for sale, but no bids were given. Then the household furniture of one and a quantity of the navigation company's stock both had ben seized. As against these seizures the Connollys had offered le-gal obections, and the present position of the matter is one to be decided in the courts.
