The Greeks Retire

Before the Advancing Forces of the Sultan.

Prospect of a Decisive Conflict on the Thessalian Plain.

Personnel of the New Greek Cabinet, With Ralli as Premier.

Talk of Intervention—Terms That Turkey Would Accept—An Armistice Said To Have Been Asked For.

Athens, April 30.—The new Cabinet Ministers include: Premier and Minister of Marine, M. Ralli; Minister of War, M. Tsimanavos; Minister of Finance, M. Simopoulou; Minister of Education, M. Carapanos; Minister of the Interior, M. Tsoulakos.

Demetrius Ralli, the new Premier and Minister of Marine, was the leader of the Opposition. He has been the Minister of Justice and Minister of the Interior, and is well known as a lawyer and orator. He is 50 years old.

Last evening's session of the Legislative Assembly was attended by 40 deputies. In the absence of a Chamber, after which crowds paraded the streets, shouting "Long live Admiral Kanaris!"

TALK OF INTERVENTION. London, April 30.—All the talk now, says the London Daily Mail's Berlin correspondent, is of the intervention of the powers. German wishes to save Greece from the consequences of defeat, and it is stated in Berlin official circles that the powers will intervene of their own initiative if Greece does not invite them.

According to a dispatch from Constantinople to the Lokalanzeiger, the Sultan will accept the following conditions as the basis of peace: The withdrawal of the Greek troops from Crete and the re-establishment of the frontier of capitulations, and to pay indemnities today along the line.

A dispatch to the London Daily Mail from Rome says that the powers will oppose by force if necessary the blockade or bombardment of Salonica, in view of the damage that would be done to foreign commerce.

It is believed in Rome that the new Greek Ministry will treat for peace, in the hope of preserving the territorial integrity of Greece. It is officially announced in Vienna that Greece has assured the British and French Governments that the Greek fleet will not bombard Salonica.

AN ARMISTICE.

Berlin, April 29.—The Frankfort Zeitung publishes a dispatch from Constantinople, saying that owing to the Greek refusal to accept the Russian demand for an armistice, the German ambassador at Constantinople, Baron von Saurma-Jeltsch, had an audience with the Sultan on Wednesday.

SOLDIERS WHO DON'T WANT TO FIGHT. THE NEW PREMIER'S POLICY. London, April 30.—M. Ralli says: "My policy will consist in the reorganization of the army whose recuperative forces are practically inexhaustible, and the re-establishment of order together with a satisfactory solution of our foreign relations. We refuse to accept a mandate from the King or from the Chamber. We must have an absolutely free hand."

COLONIAL INTERESTS. London, April 30.—A deputation of merchants, interested in Newfoundland trade, waited on the Colonial Secretary with reference to the Portuguese question. In reply to a question yesterday afternoon, submitted by Mr. J. F. Hogan, representing Mid-Tipperary in the House of Commons, Right Hon. Jos. Chamberlain, M.P., said: "We are, said the Government would be happy to discuss with the colonial premiers at their coming visit, either as a whole or individually, any question of common interest to the colonies and the mother country."

Surplus of \$13,395,000 Over Expenditure for the Year.

The Transvaal Situation Evolves a Hot Debate.

Chamberlain's Course Severely Criticized by the Liberal Leader.

London, April 30.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, read the budget statement in the House of Commons yesterday. The balanced account for 1896-97 shows the exchequer revenue to be £102,900,000 and the expenditures £101,477,000, leaving a surplus of £2,423,000. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, who was heartily cheered, added that the national debt had been reduced £7,584,000 during the year, and that the total value of British trade during the last financial year was £738,000,000—an increase of 5 per cent. He dwelt upon the increased prosperity shown by this more than by the beer grain, and the tobacco consumed.

A Great Future

For the Manufacture of Paper in Canada.

A United States Expert Says We Will Supply the British Market.

Montreal, April 30.—Ex-Senator Warner Miller, president of the Niagara Canal Company, was in the city today, his visit being in connection with his pulp mills and paper mills in the Dominion. Mr. Miller said that he anticipated a considerable boom in Canada's pulp and paper industries during the coming year. The direction which the expansion of business would take would be in trade with Great Britain rather than with the United States. The higher duties on paper imposed by the McKinley tariff would tend to throw the trade to Great Britain, even not considering the fact that the product brought a higher price there than across the border. "You have material here in Canada," said Mr. Miller, "and you have cheap water power. Have the industry of pulp and paper manufacture in Canada will see a wonderful expansion during the next few years, and will overshadow many industries that have heretofore been looked upon as Canada's chief resources. Mr. Miller already owned, in conjunction with one or two other wealthy Americans, an extensive pulp mill at Grand Mere, Que., to which he has also purchased the right to the pulp and paper mills in the near Three Rivers, where another mill will be erected during the coming summer."

Mr. Miller said he was not very sanguine that the United States would take advantage of the offer contained in the much-talked-of preferential clause. The present Republican administration had incorporated the principle of reciprocity in its policy, but its tariff was pre-eminently protective one. The opportunities for reciprocity, so far as the United States was concerned, lay rather with the tropical countries to the south, where natural products were not such as were raised in the Union. However, it was quite within the range of possibility that a mutually satisfactory treaty of reciprocity might be arranged between Canada and the United States.

Coolly Congratulations.

Toronto Suffered to the Extent of Nearly \$150,000.

Chatham Had a Blaze Amounting to \$10,000.

Roller Mill at Orillia Destroyed—Several Other Fires.

Toronto, April 30.—The fire mentioned yesterday as having broken out in the wholesale grocery establishment of H. F. Eckhardt & Co., 17 Front Street East, between 1 and 2 o'clock, was under control till 4 o'clock. Mr. Ramsay is the owner of the building, and had \$10,000 insurance on the stock. The stock was valued at \$10,000, and is almost a total loss. Part of the stock was destroyed by water and smoke, but the extent is unknown. It is fully insured.

St. Thomas, Ont., April 30.—About midnight last night fire broke out in the residence of Mr. J. H. Quaker, 17 Queen Street. Not much damage was done to the building, but the contents suffered severely from smoke and water. The loss will be over \$1,000; insured. The family were absent at the time, and the origin of the fire is a mystery.

Chatham, Ont., April 29.—At 8:30 last night fire broke out in the cooperage shop of the Stevens & Campbell Milling Company. The firemen did good execution, and the flames were confined to the building in which it started. The adjacent saw warehouse was somewhat damaged, but the main cooperage shop was saved. The losses on buildings, staves, beams, etc., will probably foot up \$10,000; insurance about \$8,000. The company will at once proceed to rebuild.

Wallaceburg, April 30.—A very serious fire broke out Wednesday night, by which the Riverside and the Victoria, owned and managed by W. J. Bader, was completely gutted, and over 4,000 bushels of grain were destroyed. The loss was \$3,000; insurance, \$1,500 in the London Mutual and West Waterloo. Cause of fire, unknown.

Milwaukee, Wis., April 30.—"Fire destroyed the Schmidt Hotel, a four-story building at 123 Huron Street, yesterday morning. Escape by the stairways was out of, and firemen with ladders rescued the fifteen inmates. Some of the women were unconscious when found by the firemen. The building was badly damaged."

About two hours later the fire department was called to the Mineral Springs Park Hotel, a popular resort near Riverside Park. The hotel was completely destroyed.
