POSSEL'S SUICIDE. Paris, Aug. 26.-Ernest Joseph Possel, the German who was held on suspicion of having killed his wife to secure the \$50,000 insurance on her life, and whose suicide was reported yesterday, took a private room in the restaurant, and asked for writing materials and breakfast. Shortly after shots were heard. The attendants, rushing in, found him lying on the floor and dying. He had shot himself in the head. Feebly *aving his hand toward two letters that were lying on the table, he asked to have them delivered. They were addressed to his mother and to the police chief of the district. The letter to the police functionary revealed his identity. In it Possel declared he had killed himself because of the accusations against him since the death of his wife. Possel came to Paris after his release in Italy to obtain insurance money in his wife's policy, but the insurance company refused to pay until the cause of his wife's death should have been established.

THE MATTER OF SUGAR DUTIES. Vienna, Aug. 26.-Emperor Francis Joseph is returning from Ischl to deal with the understanding reported to have been arrived at at the Austro-Hungarian conference at Buda-Pesth, The exact terms of the agreement will not be published until it has been approved by the respective candidates, but it is understood the Hungarian views prevailed. Each country then will regulate its customs and duties independently, Hungary agreeing to increase her contributions to the public expenditure by 2 per cent. The final solution of the crisis is therefore post-

poned to the future. Austrian sugar manufacturers are beginning to fear that after peace between Spain and the United States has been concluded, the United States will admit Cuban sugar duty free, in which case Cuba in a few years will be able to supply all the sugar America needs. thus involving a serious loss to Austria and Germany. IN THE SOUDAN

Great Battle Believed To Be Imminent.

London, Aug. 26.—A dispatch, dated Wady Hamed, Wednesday, says: The whole Anglo-Egpytian expedition has arrived here, and the advance is now commencing to El Hajir, where final concentration vall be made for the march on Omdurman, 40 miles distant, which will occupy two days, if the khalifa decides to await attack at Omdurman, as now appears likely. Refugees are arriving daily Omdurman. They all agree that the khalifa means to fight. They report

that he has 70,000 men. The attack is expected to occur about Sept. 4. The English camp of 20,000 men, extending three miles, with the white gunboats and an innumerable fleet of native boats, presents a picturesque

and animated sight. A parade was held yesterday of the entire force which is operating against the dervishes. The sight was a magnificent one. The fighting force numbers over 20,000 men, and the line was over 4,000 yards long. The artillery and camel corps occupied the center of the line. The British troops were on the left and the Egyptians on the

right. Gen.Sir Herbert Kitchener's achievement so far is a brilliant operation. Some weeks ago he announced his intention to concentrate his forces at Wady Hamed on Aug He arrived there today. Wady Hamed is a village 40 miles above Metemneh, and between 50 and 60 miles from Omdurman. It is at the foot of the long Sixth Cataract, the head of which is at Shabluka. Considering the difficulties of moving 24,000 men and impediments over the desert, and along the Nile, under a blazing sun, the achievement is proof of the splendid organization of the expedition, and augurs well for the final overthrow of the

khalifa's power. Major-Gen. Archibald Hunter com-mands the Egyptian forces, which comprises two-thirds of the expedition, and which critics agree now form capital fighting material. Major-Gen. William Forbes Gatacre commanis the British forces.

BUTCHERED IN BED

An Old Man Murdered in Buffalo by His Son. Who Confesses the Crime.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 26 .- Early this morning John Carrigan, about 60 years of age, a cartman, living at 32 Illinois street, was brutally murdered by his son Frank, aged 33 years, while he slept.
