A respectable woman cannot go to any hetel or boardinghouse to ask for a room without almost for certain being refused admisston. My sister and have often been subjected to all sors of snubs from boarding-house keepers. Though we are ladies, we have had the door almost shut in our faces when we have asked for a place to stay in, though we were willing to pay high terms At other times we have been asked impertinent questions. Chances of an Anglo-German War Growing More Remote.

ensational Dispatches From Pretoria Disc edited-Latest Estimates of Jameson's Loss.

London, Jan. 10.-The dispatch from Berlin to the Times saying it is explained that Germany only desired to protect German residents and its con sulate at Pretoria by dispatching an armed force from Delagoa Bay, and that no arrangement on the subject had previously been made with Portugal, tended to produce a better feeting. But this was counteracted by

Pretoria saying that the Boers demand the surrender of all British rights and suzerainty over the Transvaal, the pre-emption of Delagoa Bay and the cancelling of the charter of the British South Africa Company. It is further stated that the Boers have arrested, on the charge of treason, eight leaders of the recent movement among the Uitlanders of Johannesburg.

The opposition to the demands of the Boers will mainly rest on the fact that it is generally admitted that they are instigated on the whole by Emperor William, and that they form part of a studied opposition upon his Majesty's part to the colonial policy of Great Britain in Africa.
